OREGON BREVITIES

MEDFORD, Sept. 16.—The coroner's jury investigating the death of Arthur Kimball, a victim of a hunting accident last Thursday returned a verdict Saturday, that death was caused by a rifle shot fired by R. W. Dusenbury, and that the same was accidental.

BEND, Sept. 16.—Irvin S. Cobb and his hunting party, which set out from Bend last week, are apparently roughing it in real earnest. At least one of their cars is in need of a new spring, a message from N. G. Jacobson, former Deschutes forest supervisor, one of the party, sent in by

Information concerning the activities of the party has been wanting, as the carrier pigeons which were to have served as a means of communication, were left behind in the confusion incident to their departure. It is believed the party is now on the trail of the lava bear in the Fort Rock country.

Out of 98 teaching positions in Deschutes county, all but five have been filled, County Superintendent J. Alton Thompson reported this morning. The average increase of salary for the county's instructors is 15 per cent over last year and 70 per cent over that paid five years ago. Salaries in the rural school run from \$900 to \$1,125.

Arrangements will be made for a sale of breeding stock the second day of the county fair, Saturday forenoon, September 25. The sale is open to all exhibitors of breeding stock. A number of choice bucks are already listed with the secretary and afford sheepmen opportunity to make some good purchases. Several breeds are represented. Some purebred hogs will also be entered.
Hay, and men to feed and care for stock, will be provided for three days, September 23, 24 and 25. The committee is anxious to have all agricultural exhibits in place by the evening of September 23. Livestock will be in better shape for exhibition if brought in Thursday, September 23, the day before the fair opening.
Following is the fair program:

10 a. m.—Livestock judging begins. The following order will be followed: Horses, Sheep, Hogs, Cattle.
1 p. m.—Boys' and Girls' club livestock judging. The following order will be observed: Sheep, Hogs, Calves.
