\$700,000 IN DALY EDUCATIONAL FUND

Young men and women of Lake county, who desire the advantages of higher education in state institutions in Oregon, may go to college for many years to come at no expense to themselves, according to the provisions of the will of the late Dr. Bernard Daly, an old-time citizen of Lake county.

The board of trustees of the fund left by Dr. Daly met and organized recently and found that more than \$700,000 is left by the will to be used to educate the young men and women of the county, which is very sparsely populated. Probably not more than 15 persons will be available to take advantage of this offer yearly, it is thought.

The board of trustees comprises the president of the University of Oregon, the president of the Oregon Agricultural college and the board of directors of the Bank of Lakeview.

The attorney-general of Oregon has ruled that an inheritance tax of about \$180,000 must be paid from the fund, but this matter is being contested by the trustees. The federal government is also asking for a tax of about \$30,000. Until these questions are settled, it will be impossible to have any of the money available for students and so the fund cannot be used this year.

The board will hold an annual meeting in June after the high school sessions are over to receive and consider the applications of students who desire to make use of the fund.
