CRATER LAKE HOTEL HEARING OCTOBER 1

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 20.—The date of the conference of the committee appointed by Governor Olcott to investigate the conduct of the Crater Lake hotel and make such recommendations as they may deem advisable has been changed from September 24 to Friday, October 1. At this conference the committee will consider the report of Stephen Mathers, director of national parks, who made the original complaint against the hotel.

Capt. J. W. Siemens of this city is one of the nine leading bankers and business men of the state chosen by Governor Olcott as a committee to investigate the hotel situation and recommend a financial solution.

MEXICANS TO SHOW AT TEXAS FAIR

DALLAS, Tex., Sept. 18.—A telegram received by Secretary W. H. Stratton of the state fair of Texas from the offices of General J. B. Trevino, secretary of the departments of industry, commerce, and labor, at Mexico City, states that at least nine ministers and high officials of the Mexican government will accompany the mammoth Mexican national exhibit to the Texas state fair here in October. It is estimated that between 300 and 500 business men of Mexico will attend the fair.

The Mexican national government, through its representatives in this country, is bending every effort to promote friendly trade relations with the United States. Addressing a recent meeting of wholesalers in Dallas, Consul Roberto Garcia declared that the Texas state fair would furnish Texas business men with a great opportunity to establish commercial relations with Mexico. "My country will have the greatest and most complete array of exhibits this year at the state fair of Texas, that has ever been exhibited abroad," Garcia said.

60 MILLIONS THREE MOS. OIL PRODUCTION

AUSTIN, Tex., Sept. 20.—Oil production in Texas for the quarter ending June 30, 1920, was valued at \$60,315,098, according to reports made to the state comptroller and compiled by John DuPriest, head of the oil division. Of this amount, \$904,726.47 was collected as the one and one-half per cent gross production tax.

The Texas company reported the largest production for the quarter, their figures being \$9,786, 128, while the Gulf Production company was second with \$6,837,925. They paid quarterly taxes of \$146,903 and \$102,563 respectively. Reports made to the state railroad commission by oil pipeline companies showed that 7,806,642 barrels of oil were gathered by the pipeline of Texas during the month of July. Stephens county led in the amount gathered with 2,095,790 barrels. Wichita county was second with 1,328,621 barrels, and Brazoria county was a close third with 1,309,307 barrels.

OLD HOSE CART IS GIFT TO S. F. VETS

NEVADA CITY, Cal., Sept. 20.—Sixty years ago a four-wheeled hose wagon was purchased by the fire department of Nevada City from the fire department of San Francisco and after twenty years of use was placed in storage. A few days ago the old vehicle was returned to San Francisco as a gift from the local fire department to the Veteran Firemen's Association of that city.

The wagon was shipped around Cape Horn in 1850, and was among the first fire equipment of San Francisco, being the property of Pennsylvania Hose company No. 12. So beautifully was it lettered that when it was brought here Eagle Hose company changed its name to Pennsylvania in order to make the name fit and it, so continues to this day.

HAWAIIAN JAPANESE SAY THEY'RE YANKEES

HONOLULU, T. H., Aug. 21. (By Mail).—Announcement of a Japanese government census of Japanese in the Hawaiian Islands has drawn a protest from several American-born Japanese in Honolulu. They declare they are Americans, are not amenable to the laws of Japan and should not be included in any consular census of Japanese subjects in the islands.

Consul General Yada of Japan announced that census slips would be mailed to all Japanese in the territory, foreign and American-born alike, and that they could fill them out or refrain from doing so just as they pleased.

His government, said the consul general, simply wished to obtain reliable data on the Japanese population of the islands, but that the furnishing of this data would be voluntary on the part of individuals.
