CALIFORNIA NEWS

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 21.—Authority to raise its rates was granted the Southern Counties Gas Company, operating in Ventura county, by the state railroad commission here. The new rate authorizes a charge of \$2 for each thousand cubic feet, and raises the minimum rate from \$1 to \$1.50 a month. Industrial establishments are exempted from the new rates.

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 21.—B. F. Dowell, former chief of the Portland, Oregon, fire department, was elected president of the Pacific Coast Association of Fire Chiefs at the closing business session of the twenty-seventh annual convention of the association here. Butte, Montana, was selected as the place for the 1921 convention.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Sept. 21.—Aerial operations on a scale never before attempted on the Pacific coast, according to navy officers, have been planned as a part of a spectacular night attack which will be made on battleships and destroyers off San Pedro September 30, Captain Harry Henry Mustin, commander of the air force, Pacific fleet, announced.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 21.—Wives under 18 years of age are not exempt from the obligations of the part-time school law because of their marital status, according to a decision by Dr. Edward R. Snyder, commissioner of vocational education of the California state school establishment.

We Never Shut Down

Live stock keeps coming to market and we have to keep buying it and putting it through our plants whether conditions are good or poor.

Swift & Company has no control over the quantity of live stock shipped to market. Live-stock producers ship their animals to the big stock-yards markets, wherthey are sold through commission men who represent the shippers.

The result is that the live-stock supply fluctuates from week to week. We have to buy the animals, however many or few there are; and they have to be handled without delay.

We cannot hold dressed beef, lamb, mutton, veal, fresh pork, or any other fresh perishable meats, but have to sell them at the prevailing market prices within a few days. If we try to sell at half a cent under the prevailing prices, retailers would naturally buy from us as long as our supply lasted, and that supply would be used up very quickly. On the other hand, if we try to sell for half a cent higher than the market prices, the retailers, who shop around, would buy from our competitors and we would have our fresh meat left on our hands. We have to sell our products every day at prevailing market prices whatever those prices may be.

Half a cent up or down in the wholesale price means the difference between profit and loss to us.
