

CAL.-ORE. POWER CO. INSURES EMPLOYEES

At a meeting of company executives and department heads held at the home office, in San Francisco, August 26 and 27, it was decided that the dependents of California-Oregon Power company employees should be protected by and at the expense of the company. In accord with this decision, a contract was entered into with the Aetna Life Insurance Company, whereby, without medical examination, regardless of age or physical condition, all "permanent full time" employees of the company are now insured—without action on their part, and without cost to themselves. Those entering service subsequent to August 27, 1920, will not be insured until they have been six months with the company.

These policies are operative irrespective of cause of death, during working hours and out. Also special provision is made for employees under sixty years of age should they become permanently and totally disabled. This insurance is in addition to and unaffected by any payment provided for by the industrial and compensation insurance provided by law.

About 35 employees in the Klamath Falls division will carry insurance under the company's plan, 29 in the operating department and about six in the engineering department. Those in the \$1,500 class—having been with the company five years or more—are J. C. Thompson, division manager; Fred English, Carl Adams, John Foster, A. Westphal, and Carl Wells.

The insurance taken out by the company is retroactive and progressive; the amount each employee is insured for depends on his time of service. It will range from \$500.00 to \$1,500.00, the latter figure applying to those in service five years or over.

NEW LINE FOR COUNTERFEITERS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—A new counterfeiting industry has followed in the wake of prohibition.

"This industry," says Chief Moran of the treasury secret service, "is the counterfeiting of the strip label revenue stamp that goes over the corks, or that used to go over the corks, of whiskey bottled in bond. Those engaged in the manufacture of whiskey are prepared to use those counterfeit stamps and we have arrested three gangs already for doing it."

At present the main problems of the secret service, however, are to check-note raising, which Chief Moran says has increased to an alarming extent in the last year, and the forgery of government checks, which he adds "has become almost an epidemic."

Records of the secret service show more arrests and investigations during the last year than for any similar preceding period.

HEAVILY CUT

Ford cars, trucks and tractors are subject to a general price reduction, effective today, according to a telegram received by the Dauner-Patty company, local agents, averaging somewhere near 25 per cent on the factory list. There will be a corresponding reduction of dealers' retail prices, said Mr. Dauner.

Following are the new factory prices (not dealers' prices) quoted in the telegram: Ford regular touring, \$440; touring, with starter, \$510; regular runabout, \$395; runabout with starter, \$465; coupe, with starter and demountable rims, \$745; sedan with starter and demountable rims, \$795; truck with pneumatic tires, \$545; tractor, \$790. All Ford cars, trucks and tractors are affected by the price drop.
