Pursuant to ordinance and order of the Common Council of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, notice is hereby given that proposals will be received by said Council for making the improvement designed for the Alley passing from Fifth to Sixth St. parallel with Main St. through the center of Block 16, original town. Said improvement to be made in accordance with the plans and specifications of the City Engineer and for one of the classes of improvement mentioned in said plans and specifications and the ordinance ordering said improvement, which said ordinance No. 529 was adopted on the 13th day of September, 1920, and approved by the Mayor on the 14th day of September, 1920.

In placing before the voters of Klamath county my idea of the solution of the court house question, I do so without hope of personal gain no matter how settled. I wish to engage in no personalities, but fairly discuss the issues of the election as I see them.

There are nowas there has been for some years two hostile court house camps, people who have developed a mania along that line, and who will make it necessary for some one to invest in a bunch of crepe no matter how settled. Associated with one camp or the other we find a bunch (probably the unscrupulous bunch), composed of lawyers looking for fat fees and a few speculators, whose interests are served by the strife. There is also the much larger portion of the people of the county who have nothing to gain from the fight, who are not interested in its history, and who want it settled.

When we settle this question let it be settled, not in prejudice or hatred, or according to ancient history, but settle it in the light of 1920.

In most of our recent elections, there was always the effort to so influence the public mind that the average citizen will give neither time nor attention to shameful and neglected roads, lack of system, mounting taxes, inefficiency and waste, but rather that he have present at all times, in his mind's eye, the outlines of a certain Grecian structure of imposing proportions. Not so long ago the cry "Make the timber pay the taxes" was used for the same purpose, namely to bamboozle the voter.

As county commissioner my position would be as follows:

1. If Hamilton's decision is sustained, then Klamath county owns the Main street building without paying for it. If no other insuperable legal obstacles present themselves, I would favor occupying the building and using the fund on hand for other county purposes.

2. If Hamilton's decision is reversed, then the building must be paid for, and should be occupied at once.

The plan, I hope, has at least the virtue of being definite. Any plan which looks to the completion of any other building will certainly add to next court house taxes, of nearly \$200,000, enough to make our cone houses cost as half a million.

I run my own campaign, pay my own expenses, hire no snailshanders, owe political obligations to no man. The few promises that I make are made publicly. I do not even make the usual promise of "lower taxes," but will do my duty—at to see that the taxpayer gets something for his money.
