MATCHMAKER SAYS RECORD IS CLEAR

To the Public:

The city of Klamath Falls is fortunate—superlatively so.

Traveling the road which leads to industrial pre-eminence and contented citizenry this city can, with justifiable pride, point to a number of agencies instrumental in promoting

its progress and, perched triumphantly over all of them, we behold the familiar figure of Councilman Frank M. Upp.

Overflowing with camouflaged righteousness, Mr. Upp arose in all his assumed goodness during a meeting of the city council Monday night, and declared that the boxing programs held here recently were conducted in flagrant violation of the laws governing boxing in this state, and vehemently demanded that an investigation of the methods employed by the boxing promoters be sub-

jected to a rigid probe. So far, so good.

The promoters of these boxing programs recognize the indisputable right of the public to have assurance that the bouts are being held in accordance with every provision of the law and I, as matchmaker, am desirous that every requirement shall be complied with. With that end in view, I hereby publicly announce that I shall be pleased to act in strict conjunction with the boxing commission or any investigating committee that may lawfully be appointed, and pro-

duce the required information. The law requires an accurate financial statement covering the proceeds and disbursements of all boxing bouts. These statements, covering the two entertainments held here recently, I can and will give to any responsible body. I have accurate figures, returned vouchers, and all the data necessary for intelligent, truthful statements, but as almost everyone knows, the exact status of the boxing commission has so far been an unknown and unreliable quantity, and I did not care to entrust the commission in its present circumstances with important facts and figures which they might not have authority to accept and place on proper public record.

With great consideration for the commission as it now exists I repeat that its status is indefinite, and when I am assured that there is a supervising body here vested with the authority to pass upon these statements I shall comply with the law to the letter.

I do not claim infallibility. Perhaps I have "slipped up" in the matter of doctors' examinations, but I maintain that the undeniably unusual conditions governing the Labor day program gives me a valid excuse for any slight irregularity in that regard. As you all know, after the Houston theater burned I was forced to improvise an arena. I accomplished that task after overcoming numerous difficulties. I tried to get Dr. A. A. Soule, the boxing commission's examining physician, to make the required examination of the boxers. He was, I believe, busy attending to fire victims. I approached two other doctors. I failed to get their services. Turnout was everywhere.

I was obligated to the extent of \$1200 in the promotion of the program and, even though trying to the last hurried minute to procure medical assurance of the fitness of the boxers I was, plainly speaking, out of luck. As far as I could learn all of the boxers were in A1 condition.

I wish to say again that I want to be fair and above board with the boxing commission and the public. I shall gladly observe every requirement of the law. If I have not observed them fully, I shall do so when I am authentically informed regarding their extent. I intend to make my home here, and want to see the boxing game placed upon a plane, locally at least, that will insure good entertainment to all. To accomplish this the law must be obeyed. I am willing to obey the law.
