BURGLARS DO NOT VEX NONAGENARIAN

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 29.—"Twelve hours sleep a day is more important than burglars to a man of 92," according to Goodman Alexander, who told the police here that he went back to sleep immediately after a prowler in his bedroom awakened him with a flashlight. "If I let burglars and such worry me, I wouldn't be as old as I am today," he continued.

Mr. Alexander who appears to be in excellent health also said that "egg shells and hard bread preserved my teeth. I eat a soft boiled egg and then the shell every morning for breakfast." He also suggested that boys start smoking early, because, he said, tobacco soothes the nerves. "I've smoked since I was 16 and I smoke today more than a pound of tobacco every month."

Mr. Alexander has lived in Seattle since 1906, at which time he left San Francisco. He was born in Poland and came to the United States when he was 18. He is certain he will live to be 100 years old he says "providing, that thieving burglars don't steal any more of my sleep."

UNEMPLOYMENT, JAPAN

TOKIO, Aug. 31. (By Mail.)—The unemployment of coal miners in Kyushu (Southern Japan) is daily increasing. Practically one-half of the 20,000 miners engaged in the underground work in 23 miles in Northern Kyushu have left their work. The direct cause is the reduction of wages and the abandoning of the special treatment which was accorded to the men during the war. The men are leaving for other places where they can get better remuneration and treatment.

TAKES POSSESSION OF SHEEP IN MORTGAGE SUIT

A replevin action has been filed in the circuit court by the Western Bond & Mortgage company against Peter and Jerry Murphy, sheep men, to recover some 3700 head of sheep on a mortgage claim. The mortgage was for \$15,000. Plaintiff asks \$400 additional damage.

Sheriff Humphrey returned yesterday from Crescent where he took possession of the Murphy sheep and outfit, pending adjudication of the claim.

SUES FOR WAGES

J. W. Henry has filed suit against Louis N. Rahn and wife to collect \$379, which he alleges are due as wages to himself and Clarence Mitchell, for work on the Rahn ranch. Mitchell assigned his claim of \$74 to Henry, who alleges that he has \$314 coming to himself.

NO RAISE IN CAL. INSURANCE

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 30.—California is the only state in the union where automobile insurance will not be raised Oct. 1, according to an announcement by officials of the Inter-Insurance Exchange of the Automobile Club of Southern California. In some cases the rates will be lowered, it is said.

The announcement was based on an advance copy of a new schedule of rates fixed at a national conference of insurance men in New York city. This schedule, the officials state, will establish California, which has the third largest automobile registration for any state, as the "key" commonwealth in what they say a certain make of car, for instance, can be insured in California against collision for \$48.65, while the lowest rate obtainable in any other western state will be \$112 or more than double.

Rates have already been raised throughout the east, it is said, but the greatest increases are in prospect in October for Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Utah, Arizona, Nevada and Hawaii.

Cooperative insurance among motorcar owners in California is given as the reason for rates not being raised in this state. This, it is said, has caused insurance companies to maintain their former rates, or reduce them, in this state, while advancing them in others.

Information received by the same officials is that insurance rates on fire and theft, materially increased in the east, will be decreased in this state.

MINT DISTILLING ENDS THIS WEEK

Distilling the mint crop on the Pacific Coast Mint company's farm at Eagle Ridge will be finished the latter part of this week. J. M. Watkins, Jr., vice-president of the company and in charge of operations, reports that a fine grade of oil is being obtained, second to none in quality.

Planting will start on the Caledonia marsh about the middle of next week and the company hopes to get 100 acres planted before winter sets in.

L. A. RAILWAY WILL AID HOME BUILDERS

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 30.—Methods used in aiding employees to buy Liberty bonds during the war are to be utilized to aid them in building homes as the leading phase of a housing scheme under consideration by the Los Angeles Railway, according to announcement by G. J. Kuhrtis recently.

The plans contemplate the setting aside of a fund of \$150,000 to be loaned the employees at a low rate of interest for home building, the loans to be repaid by small deductions from the men's pay checks, Mr. Kuhrtis said.

Another phase of the plan is the building of "bungalow courts" where accommodations will be available for the company's employees at low rents.
