SAFE WHICH IS AUTOMATICALLY SET FREE AND FLOATS AWAY WHEN MAIL SHIP SINKS



A floating safe, an ingenious invention for the use aboard ships carrying valuable mail, has been adopted by the Dutch government. The device consists of the safe proper and a cradle in which it rests. If the ship sinks the cradle is released automatically and drifts away with the wave. The safe is kept on deck in full view of the bridge and is electrically protected against robbery. It is used to carry registered mail, bearing special stamps, which are obtainable at all Dutch postoffices.

LEARNING LANGUAGES

BERKELEY, Cal., Oct. 1—So great has been the demand from students for modern languages this year at the University of California that applicants have been turned away from some of the elementary classes. Of the 1750 that applied for tuition in elementary Spanish only 1100 could be enrolled and a similar shortage of facilities in the French department resulted in refusing admission to 157 of the 1527 that applied. In the more advanced classes the overflow has been greater, it being necessary in some cases to turn away from 30 to 50 per cent of the applicants.
