SACRAMENTO, Oct. 8.—Prohibition's killing effects on the California wine grape industry received another striking illustration yesterday when word came from New York that two cars of the valley vineyard products had sold there for \$5512 a car.

When the telegram announcing the sale reached the office of the Pacific Fruit Express in the California Fruit building, the officers of the company could hardly believe the figures.

WOODLAND, Oct. 8.—With a capital stock of \$250,000 and with Stockton as the principal place of business, Esparto and Yolo county tobacco growers have incorporated the Golden State Tobacco company, which will specialize in the manufacture of cigarettes.

LODI, San Joaquin Co., Oct. 8.—George West & Sons have made an offer of \$60 per ton for Tokay grapes to the growers for their vineyard run and will take options for the offer is good only to October 10.

The winery if enabled to dispose of the grapes offered them will exercise the options and pay cash for the fruit. But if the grapes cannot be sold the winery men reserve the right to return the options.
