SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 8.—Elaborate plans are under way here for Market week and the fall style show, to be held October 11th to 15th by the Manufacturers and Wholesalers association of San Francisco. An invitation has been extended to every buyer and merchant in the western states to "get together" at this important event and become better acquainted with the market conditions in general as well as the possibilities of San Francisco as a vast merchandising center. Over 150 of the leading merchants and manufacturers of San Francisco have joined forces to make this person attending. An interesting program includes daily luncheons, a dinner jinks, automobile rides, and a theatre party and style show.
