The scene was started. The men, according to instructions, were to flee across a lagoon. Mr. Farnum meanwhile sending real steel-nosed bullets after them. The star's aim was so perfect that the bullets fell within one foot of two of the men, sending up spray which covered them.

After the scene some of the actors who have been with Mr. Farnum in many of his pictures said they never would fear to be the target of the famous star, for his accuracy of aim was marvellous.
