

COUNTY SETS BAD EXAMPLE IN FIRE RISK

to plunging the county into temporary bankruptcy.

As long as the courthouse controversy exists, the citizens of Klamath county are condoning a dangerous fire menace. The city of Klamath Falls pursued the same policy and reaped a harvest of justified and humiliating criticism after the Houston hotel fire. One of the questions that is interwoven in the election of county judge and county commissioner in the coming election is this question, whether the unprejudiced voters of the city will profit by past experience and example?

This is not campaign propaganda but a statement of facts. The men in custody of the records know the risk that is run. The foregoing is a practical digest of the views of the county clerk, the circuit court clerk and the tax collector. Any voter who thinks this is merely "newspaper talk," designed to stampede the scared voter may interview any of the courthouse attaches and draw his own conclusions from their statements.

One set of candidates, R. H. Bunnell, for county judge, and Burrell Short for commissioner, is running on a platform that is sworn to keep alive the controversy until the public accepts the Hot Springs courthouse. The platform of Chastain and Peterson calls for the burial of this fruitless feud at the earliest moment and diversion of the money that has been spent, and will continue to be spent as long as the dispute survives, for a comprehensive road system and better schools.

ed the Oregon republican state central committee as follows:

"From standpoint of national interests as well as Pacific Northwest I strongly recommend and urge the election of Robert N. Stanfield as United States senator from Oregon. Tariff on wool, meats, farm products, lumber and protection of American interests against consolidation with European leagues, are at stake."

Senator's republican U. S. senator, Charles L. McNary, has endorsed Mr. Stanfield's candidacy in the following telegram:

"I am glad of the opportunity to endorse the candidacy of Robert N. Stanfield, republican candidate for United States senator, and believe that the election of a republican congress will promote good government."

The registration figures show that Oregon has 228,571 registered republican voters and only 93,405 democrats.
