AT THE THEATERS

James J. Corbett, who is to be seen at the Liberty theatre tonight in the Universal photodrama, "The Prince of Avenue A," is famous for many things, and not the least of these is the distinction of being the best dressed man on stage or screen.

Corbett was a bank teller and a popular clubman in San Francisco before he took up the prize ring as a profession. It was the extraordinary skill with the boxing gloves, first displayed in a California athletic club, that persuaded his friends to urge him to try for the championship. In fact, it is ring history that when the late John L. Sullivan saw Jim Corbett entering the ring he smiled out of the corner of his mouth and remarked "I'll knock that dude's block off."

James J. Corbett, or "Gentleman Jim" as he is popularly known, is immaculate in his dress. He is usually abreast of the New York fashions, and yet he never deviates far from the conventional in his clothes. In "The Prince of Avenue A," he has the role of an eastside New Yorker who gains the enmity of a certain gang because he has his clothes made on Fifth avenue.

He, therefore, has an opportunity in this feature to wear some of his correctly tailored garments, and he appears to unusually fine advantage in evening clothes, which set off his magnificent frame.

Sunday next, "The Mutiny of the Elsinore," the Metro picturization of the famous Jack London novel, will be the feature attraction at the Liberty theatre.

"The Mutiny of the Elsinore" is one of the late Jack London's last and most notable works. It is a strong tale of the sea, in which a crew of city gangsters attempt to take over the control of the ship from the officers in charge; and in

addition there is a charming love story, the thread of which is crossed by the evil passion of Andreas Mellare to possess the beautiful daughter of Jason West, a half-owner of the "Elsinore." Margaret West is in love with Dick Somers, the captain's son, and she resents the attentions of Mellare, whom she distrusts and fears; and Mellare, to accomplish his purpose of possessing Margaret, incites the crew to mutiny.

Firm, however, against the machinations of Mellare and his rascally henchmen stands John Pike, the "Elsinore's" first mate. Pike has long loved Margaret too, but the realization of his age makes him certain that she belongs to a man younger than himself. And so, when the mutiny starts, the iron hand of John Pike raises to quell it.

The role of John Pike is portrayed by Mitchell Lewis.

CANNOT FIND NEW VOLCANO

ROME, Sept. 15.—(By Mail)—Scientists say they do not believe that a new volcano was created on Mount Pisanino, near Spezia, during the earthquakes which began Sept. 7 and continued until Sept. 9 causing the loss of 500 lives.

Tongues of flame and smoke or dust were seen to be emitted from what is popularly supposed to have been a new crater opened near the mountain top.

Frank A. Perrett, the American volcanologist for the Carnegie institution, who occupies a station at Mt. Vesuvius to observe its operations, has expressed to The Associated Press the opinion that no new volcano has been formed but that the earthquakes caused displacements of subterranean strata causing a fissure in the earth's crust and that gas escaping therefrom was mistaken by on-lookers as the opening of a new crater. The phenomenon, was not a new one. Mr. Perrett said the seismic instruments showed a towering of the earth level in the earthquake district previous to the tremors. This had been observed on other occasions when earthquakes occurred.

This view is shared by Senator Caprellini, a leading geologist who has been interviewed by the Messagero and who says there may have been an eruption of gas through a fissure on Mount Pisanino and the supposed column of smoke above the mountain may have been caused by clouds of dust from falling earth. The tongues of flame, in Senator Caprellini's opinion, may possibly have been inflammable gas from underground wells of oil. He said, however, that volcanoes can appear independently of the structure of the earth's crust and that the greatest catastrophes have occurred from the appearance of volcanoes where nobody expected them.

For example, the geologist continued, Mount Etna rises out of post-Pliocene strata while the volcanoes of the Andes mountains in South America arise from granite rocks. Therefore the nature of the Apuan mountains did not exclude the possibility of a volcano appearing on Mount Pisanino.

NO PAINT USED ON TURK'S HOUSES

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 8.—(By Mail)—Turkey is a paintless land. Most of the houses are wooden and unpainted. This is not a condition growing out of the war. The short-sighted policy of the government in imposing taxes on buildings in proportion to the sightliness of their exteriors has encouraged shabbiness.

Even in Constantinople a large percentage of the residences and many of the business houses are of wood. Many of the large apartment houses and office buildings have brick or stone fronts, but wooden sides and backs. Hence the disastrous fires which have laid more than one-third of the city in ashes since the beginning of the war, and the general terror of the population when a fire alarm sounds. 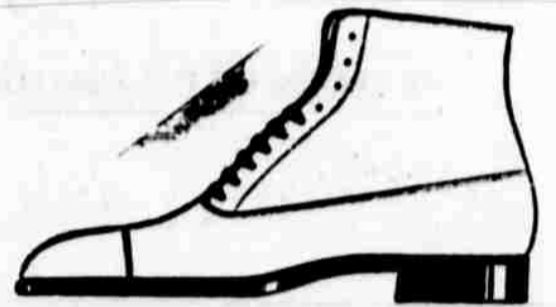

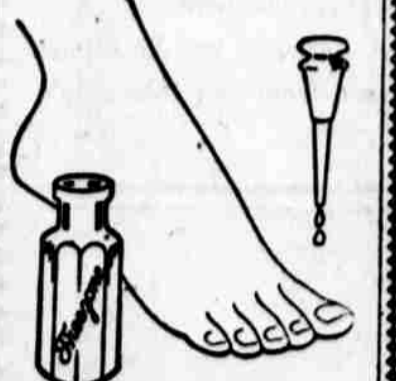
