

OREGON BREVITIES

CORVALLIS, Or., Oct. 15.—Oregon Agricultural college glee club prospects received a boost Thursday night when more than 75 men turned out for the tryouts. Several of last year's club were out and, according to W. F. Gaskins, director of the school of music and coach of the club, some good, new material was uncovered.

LEBANON, Or., Oct. 15.—Reports from the mountain summits on the line between Linn and Deschutes counties indicate that five feet of snow fell there during recent storms. The roads of the mountains are closed several weeks earlier than usual.

PORTLAND, Oct. 15.—All records

for grain shipments from northwest ports for the first three months of the cereal year have been broken this year, according to announcement made yesterday by Fred W. Clark, manager of the merchants' exchange. Figures compiled by Mr. Clark show that grain and flour shipments from northwest ports for the months of July, August and September of the 1938-39 cereal year amounted to 11,911,818 bushels. During the same period for the 1919-20 cereal year grain shipments amounted to 6,340,615 bushels. The nearest approach to the total shipments this year took place in the season of 1913-14, when the shipments for the first three months reached 9,245,992 bushels.

THE DALLES, Or., Oct. 15.—A modern street lighting system, covering nine blocks in the main business district, on Second street, will be presented to The Dalles by local merchants, according to members of an executive committee of business men, composed of A. E. Crosby, Tom West, Clyde Selts, M. Gumbert and Francis Galloway, who let the contract for the work and fixture to a local lighting concern.

PORTLAND, Oct. 15.—Plans for the development of the channel of the Columbia river from Portland to the sea will be presented to members of the United States board of engineers, now making a tour of the country, when they return to this city next Saturday, following a visit to Puget sound and other coast points.

EUGENE, Or., Oct. 15.—Upon complaint of W. B. Duncan, inspector from the office of the state dairy and food commissioner, E. Broder, James Moore and Lon Moore, proprietors of meat markets in this city, were arrested on the charge of selling meat which had not been properly protected from flies and dirt. All pleaded guilt in the local justice court and Broder and James Moore each paid a fine of \$50 while Lon Moore was fined \$10.

PORTLAND, Oct. 15.—Eleventh-hour entries for the Pacific International Livestock exposition, November 13-20, are now pouring in with every mail at stock show headquarters in the Northwestern National Bank building and present indications are, officials declare, that the show this year will break all records.
