

# REPUBLICANS FOR STANFIELD

### HARDING NEEDS REPUBLICAN SENATE—OREGON NEEDS PROTECTIVE TARIFF.

As is generally known, the present Republican majority in the United States Senate is just one vote. Republican control of that body is, therefore, in jeopardy. It is the realization of this fact which is causing Oregon's Republicans to unite in sup-

port of the candidacy of the Republican nominee for United States Senator, Robert N. Stanfield. With a difference of only one in the present Senate, Republican voters have awakened to the fact that if they vote for George E. Chamberlain they may by that every act be turning the control of the Senate over to the Democrats. On the other hand, by electing Robert N. Stanfield it is possible that his single vote may give the Republicans control of the Senate, and thus put that body solidly back of Harding. Oregon producers are fearful of the effect that the election of Cox

and a Democratic Senate would have upon them. It is quite evident that under Democratic rule rival products of foreign origin would offer a serious menace to many Oregon products. If the American standard of living is to be maintained, Oregon farmers, livestock men, fruit growers, lumbermen and woolgrowers must receive a price for their products which will enable them to make a reasonable profit over and above the cost of production. They will be unable to obtain such reasonable profit, or any profit at all, unless a Republican administration is elected to levy protective tariff duties just high enough to save our producers from the ruinous competition threatened by Canadian wheat and lumber, New Zealand butter, Australian wool, Argentine corn and beef, European beet sugar, South American meat and hides and Manchurian beans and peas.

To hamper a Republican President with a Democratic Senate flies in the face of the well accepted principle that governmental management should be centered so that people can correctly place the responsibility for success or failure. The feeling among Oregon Republicans is, therefore, becoming quite general that Harding, if elected, is entitled to the support of a Republican Senate and that, therefore, Oregon should elect the Republican Senatorial nominee, Robert N. Stanfield, to help back up Harding.—Adv.

"The Mutiny of the Elsinore," the thrilling motion picture of adventure at sea showing at the Liberty theatre, reflects vividly some of the most exciting chapters in the adventurous career of its author, Jack London. For Jack London was not only a writer of adventure; he lived life as thoroughly, deeply and colorfully as his heroes.

As a boy he was a professional sea pirate off the coast of California. At seventeen he shipped before the mast as an able seaman, visiting Japan and the Bering Sea. At sea he "split" brown and grew hair on his chest. He knew mutiny; he knew bloodshed. And he knew the call of

the sea, which made him throw up everything at the height of his success to start on a cruise around the world in a 50-foot ketch.

But Jack London was as many-sided as his books. He was a rancher, tramp, seal hunter, Alaskan gold prospector, war correspondent, a writer of fiction singularly sweeping and filled with human color, an author of searching works on economic conditions, a heavy drinker himself and one of the most powerful advocates of prohibition in his great autobiographical story, "John Barleycorn," a self-made man, a man consumed with a burning desire to live life to its fullest.

As much of his own sea experience is contained in the fierce adventure of "The Mutiny of the Elsinore," and its fight with liquor in "John Barleycorn," so much of his intellectual biography is contained in "Martin Eden."

His great story "The Mutiny of the Elsinore," is at the Liberty Sunday.

## FEAR KIN DIED IN HOTEL FIRE

MEDFORD, Or., Oct. 16.—An echo of the Klamath Falls hotel fire September 9, reached this city today with the unconfirmed report that the husband and child of Mrs. Anna Boone, employed as a waitress in the Otilimo cafe, had lost their lives in the disaster.

The report stated that two more bodies had been recovered from the ruins. Mrs. Boone has not heard of her husband or child since before the fire, despite all efforts to locate

them. They were thought to be in the Klamath Falls section about the time of the fire.

No other bodies were ever recovered than the nine exhibited at the coroner's inquest and Coroner Whitlock says no new facts have come to light in any way to confirm the suspicion indicated in the foregoing

dispatch that Mr. Boone and child may have perished.

A Sacramento report says fear is felt by relatives that Tom Quigley, supposedly a traveling salesman, perished in the fire. He has not been heard from since. Like the Boone case, there is no confirmation for this suspicion.
