HAS CONFIDENCE IN REPUBLICAN ADMINISTRATION

NEW LONDON, Conn., Oct. 19.—Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, President of Columbia University, New York, in an address here Saturday pointed out what he called defects in the present League of Nations covenant and recommended adjustment of international difficulties through a tribunal patterned after, but amplifying, that of The Hague.

A republican administration headed by Mr. Harding, he said, would not in any respect shirk its duty as one of the family of nations, though it would not become a member of the existing league.

"They are mistaken who think that the republican party when again entrusted with the responsibility for the administration of the govern-

ment will enter upon any backward path," he decided. "The spirit of progress, of ambition to serve, of zeal to solve the great and vexatious problems which confront the people, are in full possession of the republican party of 1920.

"For one, I am confident that when the reins of government shall pass into republican hands on March 4 next, the ripest wisdom, the widest experience and the best talent which the country affords will be called upon to assist in shaping those policies which shall hasten a solution of the people's problems and a meeting of the people's needs.

"No party, no government, can accomplish the impossible, but the republican party may confidently be trusted to open in 1921 a new era in the history of our country, and to make powerful and permanent contribution to the cause of international peace and concord and to the advancement of the world's satisfaction and happiness, without in any way lessening the control of the American people over their own policies and acts, and without in any way bending or breaking the Constitution of the United States, the sheet anchor of our ship of state."

Mr. Butler asserted that much discussion of campaign affairs has no reference to great present issues, which, he said, are only two in number, as follows:

"The relation which the people of the United States are to bear to other nations and to those movements of political and economic opinion that are common to civilized peoples throughout the world, and

"The relative fitness of the Democratic and Republican parties to uphold and defend the American form of government, and to deal in truly constructive and courageous fashion with the problems of taxation, of cost of living, of transportation, of labor, of housing, of public health, and of administrative ability and efficiency which immediately confront the American people."

Pointing out the record of the United States as a leader in world movements for international settlements under codified law, he reviewed the country's correspondence with foreign nations under President McKinley, Roosevelt and Taft relative to the series of Hague conferences.

and criticized those who refer disparagingly to the Hague tribunal on the ground that it failed to prevent the European war.

He said that in 1914, "though the fact is not generally known," a definite plan to strengthen the tribunal with the establishment of an International High Court of Justice was "under consideration by the governments of Europe and the United States, with every prospect of agreement."

At the end of the war, he declared, President Wilson "made a capital error of judgement" in going in person to conduct peace negotiations in Paris. This, he said, made necessary the like attendance of heads of other nations involved, with the result that they "lost contact with their immediate advisors, with their parliaments and with their peoples."

The peace settlement, he said, coming under the pressure of the times, and in settlement of the issues of war, was a mistake.

"This procedure, far from being a triumph of statesmanship," he added, "was a blunder of the first magnitude and is chiefly responsible for the unhappy events of the past two years, for the outbreak of a dozen minor wars, for the delay in economic reconstruction, and for the feelings of despair and despondency that have settled down over much of the world."

"So anxious was the world for peace, however, that nation after nation approved the covenant for a League of Nations without hesitation and without serious debate."

Mr. Butler suggested that the Republican national platform offers a policy, alternative to the League, to "accomplish the same ends in what is believed to be a far better and far wiser way."

"It is not true that Republican objections to the covenant as submitted are merely partisan, narrow-minded and selfish," he asserted. "policy contemplates deserting our Allies and associates in the war and bearing no part in the task of rebuilding the broken world."

"It is not true that Republican policy would make no sacrifice for liberty and justice, and would refuse cooperation to make the world a better and happier place in which to live."

"It is not true that Republican policy would take the incredibly stupid and reactionary course of attempting to play an isolated part in the world and look with indifference on suffering or wrongdoing or on infractions of international law unless these should directly affect our national pride or our national pocket book."

"The established policy of the Republican party points the way to such remodeling of the covenant for a League of Nations as will bring it into accord with American principles, with established American practice, and with the highest and finest American interests, without doing damage or injustice to any other nation."

"The people of the United States should understand that in opposing the covenant in the form submitted by the president, the Republican party is sustaining and not abandoning traditional American policy in respect of international cooperation and peace, and that it is steadfastly clinging to the high ideals and purposes which the American people have so often revealed in their international sympathy and their international relations."

"The Republican party, however, intends to walk toward the goal in a wise and safe, instead of unwise and unsafe, path."

"No permanent progress ever results from attempting too much or from getting out of step with the sober and judicious opinion of the world. There is no sure method of abolishing international war until human nature be abolished at the same time. All that can be done is to labor to remove the causes of international war and to put a check upon those human tendencies and passions which usually bring wars about, as to make it increasingly difficult for them to operate to the disturbance of the world's peace."
