

VERLET CONCERT ANNOUNCEMENT CREATES STIR

Much interest is being shown in the announcement of George A. Wirtz, proprietor of the Klamath Falls Music house that he has secured Mile Alice Verlet, known in her own country as the "little Belgian queen of song," for a concert appearance at the Elks Temple here next Monday night, assisted by Victor Young, pianist, Robert Velten, violinist, and the New Edison phonograph, whose makers have termed it "the phonograph with a soul." The concert will be a test of the tone qualities of the new Edison.

Music lovers expect much from Mile Verlet, who has a reputation that places her well up in the rank of the world's artists, and the novelty of the phonographic feature will appeal to every one.

Mile Verlet has a fond place in her heart for Americans and enjoys singing in this country. Her affection began with her flight from her home in Brussels, which was wrecked by the invading Germans. German efficiency spared nothing and her piano, furniture, records and other cherished possessions were all destroyed.

She fled to Paris where she sang with the Grand Opera company. When she came to America her Paris home was rented to American offi-

cers and the treatment that they accorded the furnishings furnished such a contrast to German ruthlessness that she began to love America before she ever set foot on its shores.

Length of spans 75 ft.; roadway 16 ft. wide. Live load capacity, 1600 lbs. per lineal foot. Dead load capacity, 600 lbs. per lineal foot. Steel joists 8 lines, 7 inch by 15 inch, I's. The contractor is to furnish all the steel for the superstructure, also the necessary graphite paint for one field coat. All of the steel shall be painted before being shipped.
