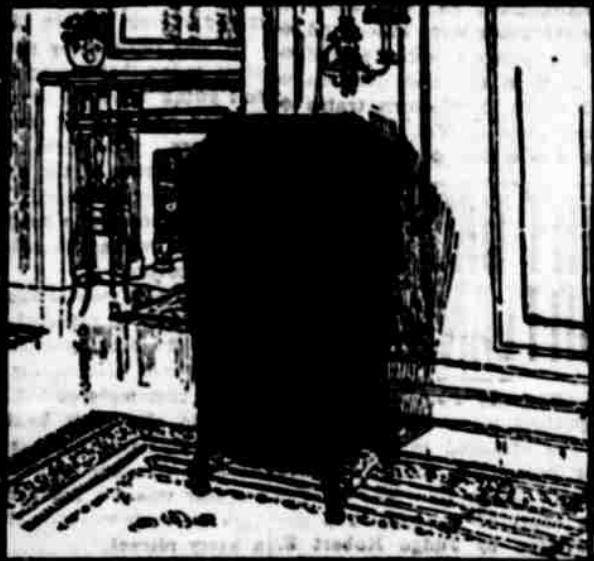
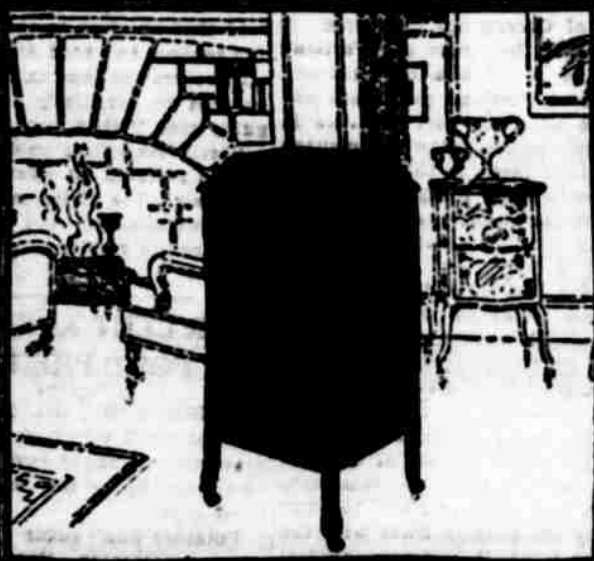

OREGON BREVITIES

PORTLAND, Oct. 20.—The big annual rally and round-up of the Portland council of Boy Scouts was held Saturday in the auditorium of the Lincoln high school. The entire first floor was reserved for the 2100 scouts of Portland and their boy friends between the ages of 12 and 18 years.
