PORTUGAL IN NEED OF MANY COMMODITIES

LISBON, Sept. 20.—(By Mail)—Portugal is suffering from a shortage of coal and provisions which have resulted in looting of food stores in some parts of the country and in the reappearance of the formerly familiar long lines of women standing outside of bakeries waiting for bread. The situation has been complicated by an announcement of the minister of the interior published in the Seculo that the government has become aware of a bolshevik plot to provoke disturbances all over Portugal, so as to lead up to a general movement later. The minister made it known that the government had taken precautions to frustrate these plans.

There have been severe conflicts at Santarem, Setubal and in other parts of the country where stores

have been looted and emptied of their contents. The military authorities assumed control in Santarem fish market was attacked by a mob which seized the fish and divided it among themselves. Dry cod formerly was the chief and favorite food of the people but is now so expensive that only the well-to-do can afford it. One shopkeeper appealed the mob by distributing his supply of cod fish and thus was allowed to retain his other wares.

The seriousness of the shortage of food and fuel has been emphasized by a statement of Premier Granjo made in parliament in which he said that there was a lack not only of coal and provisions but of all other articles indispensable for living. Since there was only 10,000 tons of sugar to supply the country, the government was going to prohibit its sale in restaurants and pastry shops so that the hospitals of Portugal might not run short.

Butter, lard, coal, oil and even vegetables have disappeared from the market since government prices were fixed for those articles," said the premier. "The bread question is even more desperate than the others. The wheat in this country will barely suffice to supply bread for the

next five days. Wheat contracts are being closed by the government at a very high price. The maize harvest is so bad that we have already imported 100,000 tons of it. There is not coal in the city of Lisbon where the poor are tearing up their floors to cook their food and the foreign coal is sold at such an exorbitant price that it does not even allow our fishing vessels to go to sea for fish."

In view of this crisis, the premier appealed to parliament for aid and efforts are being made to obtain wheat from the big farmers in the Ribatejo district.

commissioner and re-paying. If so they will vote for the \$92,000. If they believe these things are not necessary, they can avoid voting on this question, narrowing their discretion to the other question. Here they must decide whether a levy should be made to raise \$52,000 which the council estimates is needed for strictly governmental expenses. In the event that they negative this proposal the city will be thrown back to last year's levy, about \$42,000, plus the six per cent increase to which the state constitution limits municipalities in absence of the voters' express consent, or about \$2500 more.

Neither question includes the \$27,900 that must be raised to pay the bonded indebtedness principal and interest. A vote for the \$52,000 means a 20 mill tax to raise this amount plus \$27,900, or about \$80,000 for all purposes.

A vote for the \$92,000 means a 30 mill tax to raise this amount, plus \$27,900, or about \$120,000 in all.
