N. D. WOMEN VOTE

amendment, North Dakota women will be privileged in November to vote for all candidates and on all questions. Heretofore, women in this state were permitted to vote for superintendent of public instruction.

North Dakota election law, according to Attorney General William Langer, is such as to make the operation of the federal suffrage amendment effective in this state without the necessity of re-convening the state assembly.
