JOHNSON TELLS WHY HE'S FOR G.O.P. NOMINEE

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 23.—Just prior to his departure for Chicago to begin his national campaign tour for Harding and Coolidge and against the Wilson league of nations, Senator Hiram W. Johnson issued the following statement here:

"Since the campaign commenced there has been no doubt about Senator Harding's position upon the league of nations. Some interested parties, for purposes of their own, have endeavored to misrepresent him. Yesterday, in language so plain that even they could not misunderstand it, Senator Harding stated again his opposition to the league.

"I oppose the proposed league," he said, "not because I fail to understand what a former member of the Democratic administration has said 'we are being let in for,' but because I believe I understand precisely what we are being let in for. I do not want to clarify those obligations; I want to turn my back upon them. It is no interpretation but rejection, I am seeking."

"Some time since I remarked that Senator Harding had scrapped the league. This was denied by some wobbly gentlemen and some left-handed newspapers. They may yet insist he has not 'scrapped' it; he has only turned his back upon its obligations and seeks its rejection. The senator's forthright stand upon this overshadowing issue has given him the enthusiasm in this campaign and will give him an overwhelming victory in November."

Although it is not expected that Senator Johnson will return to California in time to participate in a San Francisco mass meeting, he will be home in time to vote. He said: "I will be back in time to vote for Samuel M. Shortridge and thus make his plurality \$100,001 votes."
