## VERLET CONCERT GREAT SUCCESS

Every seat was filled and the rear of the hall at the Elks Temple was well sprinkled with persons who arrived late for the Verlet concert last night. The program was well selected. Mile. Verlet, Victor Young, pianist and Robert Velten, violinist, proved accomplished artists and the tone tests with the Edison phonograph were startling in their proof of the inventor's claims that he has at last made a machine that recreates both vocal and instrumental tones exactly as they are sung or played in the original.

If there was any shade of difference in the performance, the comparison between the pianist's own execution and the recreated performance of the phonograph showed to best advantage the wonderful exactitude of the machine. But there was little to choose in worth from the program.

Mile. Verlet won loudest applause in the latter part of her program in old ballads—"Coming thro' the Rye" and other of the heart-stirring type. So clamorous were the audience for further entertainment that she was forced to respond to several encores.

At one point in the program the lights were turned out while singer and phonograph were in the midst of their performance. The song continued in the darkness, but when the lights were turned on it was found that the singer had left the stage and the machine alone was responsible for the melody. A general laugh proved the genuineness of the deception.

Mr. George A. Wirtz was showered with congratulations by the departing audience and grateful appreciation of the entertainment he had made possible.

The machine used for the tone tests was the property of the Elks, purchased several months ago, showing that rumors that the artists use a special make of machine for the tests is not true.

#### TWO DIVORCE SUITS FILED IN LOCAL COURT

Two divorce cases were filed in the office of the clerk of the circuit court this morning. One is Minnie Hough, plaintiff vs Hugh Hough. They were married, the complaint states, at the Fort Klamath agency February 22, 1909, and have lived in Oregon and California since that time. The plaintiff alleges cruelty as ground for divorce.

The other case is that of William H. Lashua against Marie Lashua, married since July 1912. Plaintiff alleged desertion as cause for divorce. She says defendant left her in October, 1912, three months after marriage.

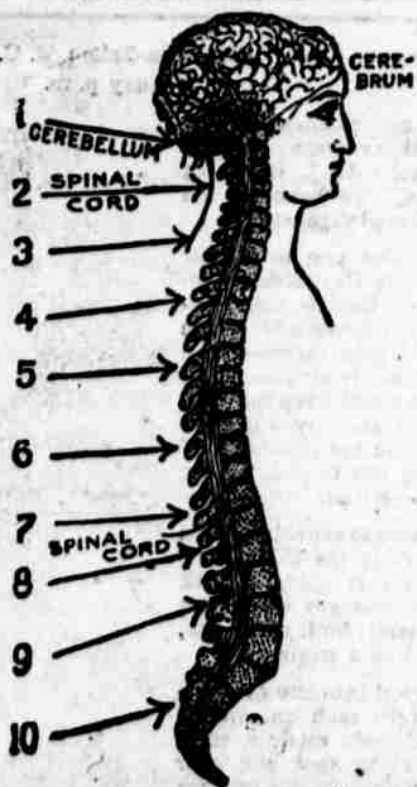
