NOT ASKED TO ATTEND, CLAIM

An attempt is being made by op-
position candidates to create an im-
pression in the mind of Bonanza and
Langell valley residents that George
Chastain, candidate for county judge,
was advised that meetings were to be
held at Bonanza Monday night and
Lorella Tuesday night and deliber-
ately slighted the invitation to be
present, according to local support-
ers.

Friends of C. R. De Lap, candi-
date for county clerk, declare that
the same story is circulated in Lan-
gell valley regarding him, and that
he likewise had no knowledge be-
forehand that the meetings were to
be held.

There was chagrin in the Chas-
tain and De Lap camps yesterday
when friends in the Lorella section
got into long distance communication
and reported the tales that were cur-
rent, but both Mr. Chastain and De
Lap were en route to Merrill, where
they held a meeting last night and
could not be switched to the Lorella
meeting.

"We knew absolutely nothing in
regard to either the Bonanza meeting
Tuesday night," said Mr. Chastain
over the phone last night, or would
have been glad to have attended,
both Mr. De Lap and myself. We
have no objection to our opponents
holding meetings to which we are
not invited, but we do protest against
unfair and untrue statements that we
were invited and did not care to at-
tend."

The meetings were well attended, it
is reported. They were addressed in
the interests of the incumbent candi-
dates for the county court by Judge
R. H. Bunnell and Commissioner
Burrell Short, the candidates, and
by E. L. Elliott, attorney.

CALIFORNIA NEWS

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 27.—When
the Los Angeles river overflowed in
1914, washing away a number of
houses and other buildings, B. T.
Rozelle, a rancher near Downey, 12
miles southeast of Los Angeles, mis-
sion his automobile. Recently excava-
tors found the machine six feet un-
derground near the Rozelle ranch.
Rozelle says the car will still run.

SACRAMENTO, Oct. 27.—State
officials who have daughters at the
University of California and who are
opposed to Amendment No. 12,
which provides for levying a direct
tax on The People to support the
college, have received letters from
them requesting that they make pub-
lic statements in behalf of the
amendment.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 27.—The
district court of appeals has af-
firmed a judgment of \$50 damages
awarded to Errol Jones, a minor
negro, against Oliver Kehrelein and
others, operators of a Fresno moving
picture theatre, for discrimination
against him on account of color. The
discrimination consisted in the seat-
ing of Jones and a young woman
companion at the right side of the
theatre which was set apart, accord-
ing to the appellate court, "for what
the defendants termed 'the dark
races,'" and refusal to permit them
to sit in the center section.

SACRAMENTO, Oct. 27.—The fi-
nal chapter of the legal proceedings
brought to close the Casino dance
hall under the Redlight Abatement
Law was written when the supreme
court, sitting in Los Angeles, denied
the owners of the property a rehear-
ing. This sustained a judgment of the
third district court of appeal
which denied them a writ of mandate
to compel Superior Judge Charles O.
Busick to accept a bond to permit
the hall to remain open.

CHICO, Butte Co., Oct. 27.—Rice
hauling this season, as it did last
season for the first time, is being
watched by the county traffic
officer in order to prevent violation
of the county ordinance limiting the
load to 16,000 for each truck.

MARYSVILLE, Oct. 27.—From all
the preserves and hunting grounds
in Yuba and Sutter counties come
reports of many limits on wild ducks
during the first of the season. O. C.
Powell and A. C. Powell, brothers of
this city, experts in the sport, each
had the limit before 7 o'clock on the
opening morning.

REDDING, Oct. 27.—Three hun-
dred feet of Southern Pacific track
was washed out at Panarama Point,
midway between Anderson and Cot-
tonwood, when the main canal of the
Anderson-Cottonwood Irrigation dis-
trict broke.

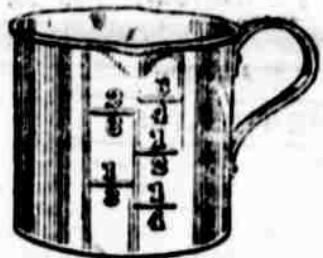
