1889 LANDMARK BEING MOVED

The old Bowdoin residence, the first home erected east of Main street in Klamath Falls by J. A. Bowdoin in 1889 and which has been located at the rear of the Baldwin hardware building, has been sold to Mrs. J. A. Cook and is being moved to the corner of Commercial and Ninth streets. Baldwin who has sold the property, stated that he is not contemplating erecting anything in its place at the present time, but intimated that he is considering something along that line for the future.

The Bowdoin residence is one of the oldest landmarks of Klamath Falls.

Falls. The contractors who are moving it have found all of the timbers in an excellent state of preservation and had no trouble whatever in lifting it from its long resting place. W. E. Bowdoin, a son of J. A. Bowdoin, now deceased, is an employee in the mechanical department of The Evening Herald. The elder Bowdoin was the pioneer newspaper man of Klamath county, having established the Linkville Star in 1884.
