PORTLAND, Oct. 25.—William Moore of Damascus, was instantly killed near here by the accidental discharge of a 12-gauge shotgun in the hands of his brother, Henry Moore, 12. The full charge of shot entered the boy's heart from a short distance.

ROSEBURG, Oct. 25.—Returning from Scottsburg, Sheriff George Quine states that it is quite evident that Frank Wagner, the escaped convict who is believed to have been responsible for the safe robbery at Hedden's store and postoffice at Scottsburg, eluded the officers by drifting down the Umpqua river in a boat and catching a freight train from Reedsport. Several boats are missing and it is evident that Wagner took one of these and rowed to Reedsport, wrecking the others so he could not be followed.

MEDFORD, Oct. 25.—Aaron Payne, a bachelor 40 years old and his nephew, Johnnie Payne, 18 years old, both of same valley, were drowned in Rogue river, when the boat in which they were fishing capsized. The bodies were recovered.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 25.—The Salem water supply is pure and was not in any way responsible for the several cases of typhoid fever at present prevalent in this city, according to Dr. R. E. Pomeroy, city health officer.

PORTLAND, Oct. 25.—A noticeably large crowd gathered around the Columbia Park football team Friday night as it practiced under the arc lights. The "center" was the center of interest, for a fair Amazon held that position and tackled the men of the scrub team who tried to pass her.

PORTLAND, Oct. 25.—Prohibition laws will not cheat Good Samaritan hospital out of a bequest consisting partly of three barrels and 12 fruit jars full of wine and whiskey, for President Judge Tawell signed an order to have the 70 gallons of liquor delivered to the institution. The gift is valued at \$600, and is part of the estate of the late George Boschlin, who died August 14 from cancer. The hospital also will receive an settlement of the estate, between \$27,500 and \$40,000,

consisting of money, securities and rental properties.

LAKEVIEW, Or., Oct. 25.—Eighty thousand lambs have been purchased and shipped from Lakeview since September 1 by a sheep-buying concern of Salt Lake City. Since September 1 lambs have been leaving Lakeview at the rate of 30 carloads a day and the concern buying the lambs says it will purchase 20,000 more to be shipped during the next month. It is estimated that Lake county's lamb crop shipped from Lakeview will bring returns of more than \$500,000 to the sheep raisers in the county. The average price paid for the lambs which have been sold has been about 9 1/2 cents a pound.

PORTLAND, Oct. 25.—An optimistic attitude toward final readjustment of the freight rate problem in the northwest, particularly in

its bearing on the lumber situation, was evidenced by Carl R. Gray, president of the Union Pacific lines, who arrived in Portland after a two-day trip over the O. W. R. R. & N. lines in Washington. The Union Pacific head and his staff of department executives, accompanying him on his regular tour of inspection, remained in the city until Monday night.
