

POPE BENEDICT PATRON OF ART

ROME, Oct. 18.—(By Mail)—Although the popes of today cannot afford to spend enormous sums on artists, sculptors and decorators as did the pontiffs of the renaissance, Benedict XV is a patron of the arts, and has allowed two artists to have studios and work on the grounds of the Vatican. They are Quadroni, the sculptor, who at the Pope's expense is modelling a more than life-size statue of the Cardinal Rampolla for his monument in the Church of Santa Cecilia and the artist Antonelli who is painting a huge picture of the promulgation of the code of canon law.

The picture of Benedict XV seated on a throne, receiving from his co-worker, Cardinal Gasparri, the volumes containing the newly codified canon law, represents 52 figures, all portraits of the ecclesiastic and lay court of the pontiff. There are to be seen 10 cardinals, the Pope's Major-domo, Monsignor Taceti, his Master of the Chamber, Monsignor de Sampedro, the Grand Marshals, who have charge of great Vatican ceremonies and wear the picturesque renaissance dress of ruff and doublet; the commanders of the Noble Guard, the Swiss Guard, and many others, so the picture will have considerable historical interest in the future.

Round the enormous frame there are portraits of past popes who have specially interested themselves in the codification of the canon law, Pius X, Boniface VIII, Innocent III, Alexander II, Gregory IX and Benedict XIV.

The block of Carrara marble for Quadroni's statue of Cardinal Rampolla weigh 19 tons, and the statue will be over six feet and nine inches high, with an angel in high relief behind it. The monument will eventually be placed in the Basilica of Santa Cecilia in Trastevere, which was Cardinal Rampolla's titular church, the lower part of which he restored gorgeously in 1901.

Benedict XV frequently visits the studios of both of these artists, advising with them as to the work which they are carrying out for him.

CURRY COMBS SCARCE

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 8.—Curry combs are hard to find in Los Angeles stores. Recently an order for curry combs was sent to Los Angeles by Santa Monica fishermen who wanted them for scaling fish. "Not a one in town" was the reply. "We may be able to find some for you but there is no call for them anymore."

Better Brakes for Freight Cars Needed

PARIS, Oct. 19.—(By Mail)—Need for hastening adoption of the "continuous brake" on freight cars says, M. LeTroquer, minister of public works, says is made apparent by the wrecking of an express train outside Paris a few days ago. Nearly 50 persons were killed and scores injured.

Such brakes are provided for in the economic section of the peace treaties, he said, but their adoption depends upon agreement among European countries.

The "continuous brake" is designed to operate automatically upon cars that may break loose from a train. The recent accident was caused by several loose cars becoming detached when they rolled down grade to the forward part of the freight train, waiting for them. The loose cars fell across the track of the express that arrived half a minute later.

ARGENTINA TRADE FIGURES

BUENOS AIRES, Oct. 16.—(By Mail)—Official figures just published show that for 1919 the trade balance in favor of Argentina was \$375,192,964, gold, as compared with \$300,863,736 in 1918. Total imports for 1919 were \$1,030,965,258 and for 1918, \$801,466,488. During 1919 exports of livestock and derived products were valued at \$548,730,950. Farm products exported amounted to \$438,435,276.

65,000 STW YOSEMITE

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 8.—Government figures recently announced show that 63,365 persons entered the Yosemite National park during the 1920 season. In 1919 the total was 58,362, which was an increase of approximately one hundred per cent over the year before.

GET BIG BUG LIBRARY

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Nov. 8.—Several thousand pamphlets, papers and reprints of articles concerning insects recently were presented to Stanford university by Dr. Vernon Kellogg, who served here for 25 years as head of the department of Entomology. Dr. Kellogg recently resigned to become permanent secretary of the national research council at Washington, D. C.

OVERRUN BY RELATIVES

TACOMA, Wn., Nov. 8.—Warning to young men not to go to South America to marry was given here recently by Mrs. Charles Robinson, Tacoma, who recently arrived here after serving several years as an educational missionary in Bolivia. "In the typical high class Bolivian home of 40 rooms, the young bride often receives her relatives for visits of five or six years duration," she said.

48 FILIPINOS PASS LAWYERS EXAMINATION

MANILA, P. A., Oct. 10.—(By Mail) Out of a class of 276 who took the examination for admission to the bar in the Philippine Islands, 48 were successful, according to announcement of the supreme court today. All of the successful candidates were Filipinos, with exception of one American.

One of the successful candidates was a Filipino woman, Miss Josefa Abiertas, who is the sixth Filipino woman to be admitted to practice law in the Philippine Islands.

CHRISTEN NEW SUGAR MILL WITH CHAMPAGNE

MANILA, P. I., Oct. 10.—(By Mail)—A bottle of champagne was broken over the fly wheel when the machinery of the latest sugar central to be erected in the Philippine Islands, was set in motion late in September, at Iago, Occidental Negros.

The new mill, the property of the Ma-ao Sugar Central company, is now ready to begin grinding the new sugar crop which will start to mature about November 1st.

The mill which has a capacity of 1500 tons a day, represents an outlay of \$4,500,000, including about 50 miles of narrow gauge railroad track for the transportation of the sugar cane from the plantations to the central.
