STYLES ARE QUICKLY COPIED

Ultra Fashionable attire has but a short life in these days of clever imitations.

When great dressmakers tell their fine customers that a particular style of dress is now "out of fashion" they do not mean that it is now rarely seen, but that it is seen everywhere and has in fact "become common," says the Spectator, London. They mean that a crowd of women who cannot afford to pay for novelty, but can afford all the pretty things a week after the fair, when they are no longer startling, are dressing up in them "to admiration," are rivaling, are sometimes bettering those who first had them, and making it necessary that these latter should fling them aside and prepare to put a new figure. The same thing is true about men to a less extent, the exact degree of studied negligence or precision in the attire of the well dressed varying in proportion as the "reach-me-downs" become facsimiles.

Every year the crowds of those who copy become larger. They follow hard upon the heels of their models, who double and twist as they realize that their pursuers are gaining upon them, making now and then a feint of imitating their imitators in order to gain time. It used to be easy to guess a woman's place in the world by her clothes. Mayfair and Hampstead did not look alike. The working girl and the girl at leisure could be instantly recognized as such. At present it is a nice question to decide who is who by appearances and clothes offer an uncertain indication, not only of fortune and station, but even of age and honesty.

He Made Eugenie Weep.

An old singer living in England, M. L. Albani Gye, recalls an incident which indicates how heavily the late Empress Eugenie bore her many sorrows.

"Many years ago I used to take my holiday on Deeside," he writes the Daily Telegraph, "and once at least every season was called to Balmoral to sing before Queen Victoria. On one of these occasions the empress, who was on a visit at the castle, came with the queen to hear me. I believe that she had not heard any music since the death of the emperor, and I had scarcely finished my first song when she burst out crying. The queen, on seeing this, began to cry also, and I, too, from sympathy, I presume, with the two great ladies, could hardly restrain my tears. I, however, very soon recovered my composure and was able to continue my work."

Gardens of Ashes.

The town of Sheephead Bay some years ago entered into an arrangement with the borough of Brooklyn when the contents of all the Brooklyn ash barrels were delivered for the filling of a great swamp.

The refuse, reaching Sheephead Bay in large metal tanks, was carried out into the swamp by specially constructed trolleys and dumped. In this way some hundreds of acres were converted into dry land.

The refuse contained so much vegetable and animal matter that almost immediately grass and sunflowers began to grow on the surface of the material. By the end of the second year many Italians had planted most of the area with cabbage and other vegetables. The ash dump became a truck garden.

STATESMAN OF ITALY LAUDS THE LEAGUE

LONDON, Nov. 11.—The fate of the league of nations depends upon the moral cooperation of those peoples who, inspired by a true sense of justice, are conscious of the necessity for solidarity in international relations, Count Sforza, Italian minister of foreign affairs, has written in a letter to the statesman abroad.

In his instructions to Italian diplomatic agents, Count Sforza expressed his ideas on the league, speaking of the realization of its imperfections by the states which contributed to its formation and the necessity for the admission of states not yet members in order that the league's authority can be assured and its structure perfected.

As a result of bitter criticism and loud praise of the league, there has been considerable scepticism of the new institution, wrote Count Sforza, therefore making the diffusion of exact knowledge of what the league of nations really is the more valuable for restraining diffident and sceptical censors as well as superficial and irresponsible eulogists. He continued:

"It is necessary to instill the firm conviction that the new institution, which has been invoked for centuries by the Italian philosophical and legal doctrine, represents a higher degree of the evolution of law based on a higher unity than that of the

state. The creation of a league of nations aims at securing the integrity of its members and maintaining international peace. It does not therefore exclude the hypothesis of war; it excludes it as the supreme right of the strongest, as the supreme appeal to violence, as an event abandoned to the caprices and vacillations of fortune; it admits it, on the contrary, as an affirmation of the moral power of right for re-integrating the community of states broken by the disturbances of international peace, and thus its function comes to correspond to the penal function of each state within its own borders."

Italian diplomatic agents abroad are informed that it is the duty of Italy to promote knowledge of the league. They are requested to report all manifestations regarding the league to the special department for the league of nations in the Italian foreign office.
