Stories Told of Oliver Cromwell Would Lead One to Doubt His Complete Sanity.

If Oliver Cromwell had lived in these days a committee of alienists doubtless would have investigated his sanity before now. For the Protector had a most abnormal streak in his mental make-up. Fancy a man that could sign the death warrant of a king and then turn and spatter the ink from his pen into the face of a friend. In his youth taverns were the chief resort of Cromwell. His rascals and boisterous behavior early estranged him from his equals and he came to associate with a class beneath him. For he could brook no interference or contradiction. The matter of the score at the inns where he caroused concerned him very little; the bills frequently went unpaid and he became extremely unpopular with the alewives of Huntingdon who, when they saw him coming, would lock the doors to keep out the noisy bully. So Oliver turned out to be a wild and dissipated youth. The same incorrigible spirit ran throughout his life. It led him to encourage his soldiers to play practical jokes upon each other, such as putting hot coals in the other fellow's boots. OBJECT TO MENIAL DUTIES

Reason That is Assigned for the Present Scarcity of Trained Nurses in Hospitals.

The full utility of many hospitals is now impaired by a lack of nurses writes "Girard" in the Philadelphia Press. Howard Butler, Jr., is trustee of an important hospital here and he tells me they need 30 per cent more nurses than they can get. "Why are nurses so scarce?" I asked. "I presume," answered Mr. Butler, whose business, as you know, is that of a banker and broker, "it is because girls think they can earn more money in an easier way in some other occupation."

I have talked with doctors of wide hospital experience about it and they say that the old practice of making girls in training for nurses do drudgery for a year or so has prevented many young women from entering the profession.

"What good," said one great surgeon, "did it do to a nurse's skill to make her scrub floors or wash windows? As well make medical students polish shoes, keep up the furnace fires and sweep out the lecture rooms."

Another physician of long experience and who is connected with a big hospital, added: "The hospitals will be obliged to cut out the manual labor for training nurses and will probably reduce the years of training, or the country will go back to the conditions when it had few or no trained nurses."
