

**Quit Civilization
to Live on Island**

LONDON, Oct. 29.—(By Mail)—A party of 40 enthusiastic adventurers headed by F. P. Rhodes Disher, fellow of the royal geographical society, have decided to spend the rest of their lives on a tropical island away from excessive taxation. They will leave for the South Seas next month in a schooner yacht, the Medora.

"More than 1000 people have asked to come with us," said Mr. Disher. "Our first party includes doctors, soldiers, planters, ex-officers,

surveyors, engineers, a wireless operator and a clergyman. Several of the party are taking their wives and families with them.

"Until we have secured an island or a portion of one and fitted it up temporarily we shall live in our vessel. One strict rule is that the colony shall have no politics," Mr. Disher added.

**ALBANIA HAS
NO POSTOFFICES
R.S.'S OR PAPERS**

ELBASSAN, Albania, Oct. 29.—(By Mail)—One of the cheering sights that greets the American visitor to Albania is the American flag. In all the larger towns the stars and stripes may be seen side by side with the colors of Albania. This is the outgrowth of the work of the American Red Cross which established hospitals and orphanages in the principal towns. Most of the American relief workers have now withdrawn, but the native Albanians have kept the American colors flying as evidence of their appreciation and gratitude to their benefactors.

Italy's action is withdrawing from Albania has given fresh impetus and strength to the Albanian yearning for complete independence and freedom from foreign protectorates or mandates. But the country is scarcely strong to stand alone. She needs the aid of England or America to enable her to become a virile, self-supporting, self-governing state.

The country is extremely primitive. There is not a single mile of passenger railroad, not a telegraph wire, not a mile of good highways, not a newspaper or a postoffice. It required eight days for The Associated Press correspondent to travel from Scutari to Koritza, a distance of about 125 miles. The journey had to be made on horseback, which is the only form of conveyance outside of the immemorial ox-cart.

Though Albania is divided between Mohammedan and Christian and further divided by the existence of different sects of both these religions, the national consciousness is predominant everywhere except in very few communities in the south where Greek influence has reached in through the medium of the Orthodox church. Every Albanian is an Albanian first and inherits a tradition which has, through many generations, prohibited religious persecutions of any sort.

The Albanian is a good business man; a good soldier. He is extremely independent. His great fault grows out of the fact that the only means of punishing murder and certain other heinous crimes is by personal vengeance.

**Ancient Documents
Found in Egypt**

PARIS, Oct. 28.—(By Mail)—Thousands of mummified bodies of the sacred this have been found by the French savant, Mr. Lacau, in the underground necropolis under the famous ruined temple at Deir Medineh, Egypt.

Each bird was in an elaborately decorated vase of earthenware embedded in a sort of cardboard formed by a conglomeration of papyrus which totalled hundreds of thousands of written documents.

M. Lacau said the find was one of the most important of the late discoveries in Egyptology. The work of deciphering the documents will take years.

"It is the wastepaper basket of ancient Egypt," said one of those charged with the work.
