STRAYED CARS GETTING BACK TO OWN LINES

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 15.—An earnest effort is being made by the Good Railway Service' association of California and other public spirited bodies to aid the railroads in a campaign to re-locate freight cars on the lines of their owners in order to provide proper opportunity for renewals and repairs, and thus improve the quality of the equipment offered to shippers. To this end car service rules requiring the shipper to load cars to or in the direction of the owning road will be rigidly enforced.

Mr. John S. Drum, chairman for Northern California of the Good Railway Service association, which is comprised of more than 600 public spirited men, explains the situation as follows:

"During the federal administration of the railroads the freight car

equipment was practically pooled and interchanged indiscriminately, regardless of ownership, which naturally resulted in cars being widely scattered. Some Pacific Coast railroads have not seen their own equipment for three years, and naturally this equipment while in the hands of other roads was given only running repairs.

"Since the return of the railroads to their owners a consistent effort is being made, under mutual agreement of all roads, as established by car service rules, to re-locate freight cars on their home lines. At present, therefore, shippers are required to confine the use of cars of the railroads on which the shipment originates to shipments for local points on the line and to use foreign road cars into foreign territory. If shippers generally will co-operate in the matter it will redound to their benefit by improving the car supply and the quality of equipment provided.

"Shippers in placing orders for cars should show destination and routing in order to give the railroad the proper opportunity to furnish a suitable car for off-line shipments. In the event that this is not done and the car is loaded without the permission of the railroad on which the shipment originates, it

would make it necessary to transfer the freight—so it is to the advantage of shippers to avoid danger of expense and delay by co-operating with the railroads to the end that everyone may be better served."

Britishers Want Less Drunkenness

LONDON, Oct. 29.—(By Mail)—To combat excessive use of intoxicating liquor in England, a campaign will be inaugurated shortly by the "fellowship of freedom and reform" whose chief planks in their platform will be individual freedom, true temperance, reform of the public house and abolition of drunkenness.

The new organization has for vice-presidents the Earl of Denbigh, the

Dean of Exeter, Sir Alfred Fripp, surgeon in ordinary to the king; the Archbishop of Wellington, Sir Arthur Cope, Henry Arthur Jones and J. W. Locke.

It is said not to be intention of the fellowship to interfere with W. E. ("Pussyfoot") Johnson in the way of breaking up his meetings when he comes from Scotland, but to so educate the public that it will be unnecessary for him to return to England.

Rooms of Suicide Snapped Up Fast

PARIS, Oct. 27.—(By Mail)—One thousand francs only remaining of her former wealth, Madeleine Moreno who was a renowned singer in gay Paris theatre before she married Joseph O'Brien, a coachman for one of the wealthiest residents of the Champs Elysees, invited her husband out to dinner a short time ago.

To one of the most expensive restaurants in Paris, the scene of Madeleine Moreno's former splendor, they went. They returned home about 2 o'clock in the morning, minus the 1000 francs. An hour later Mrs. O'Brien cut her husband throat with a razor, then committed suicide.

somely furnished flat in a street leading from the Champs Elysees, reported the matter to the police and in a few minutes a distinguished looking man called.

He made many inquiries concerning the affair, which the concierge answered.
