Only Citizens May Lease Oil Lands

(By Associated Press) MANILA, P. I., Nov. 20.—Only citizens of the Philippine Islands or of the United States, or corporations, composed wholly of citizens of either of these countries or both, may make application for leasing of petroleum lands of the public domain, or for the privilege to work and develop deposits of petroleum or other mineral oils or gas on lands of private ownership, according to a decision of the Philippine council of state.

Secretary Apacible of the department of Agriculture and natural resources said these rules are more liberal than the regulations adopted by the council of state regarding the exploitation of the coal lands of the islands. He stated that the government in making the regulations regarding petroleum lands had in mind the fact that there is practically no oil land in the archipelago that has been fully exploited and that the rules were purposely made liberal in order to encourage prospecting in the islands.

SUPERIOR WIT NECESSARY TO CONQUER SHARK

EL PASO, Tex., Nov. 20.—Matching brains with a shark is the only way to catch one of these wily man-eaters, according to Chief Pharmacist Mate Hugh Thompson of the local recruiting station of the navy. Thompson says that the sharks are so shrewd that ordinary means often fail, and it is then that strategy comes in. He backs it up with a yarn.

The U. S. S. Wilmington was in the harbor of Saigon, which, Thompson says, is the worst shark-infested place in the world. Hundreds of sharks surrounded the boat, and Chief Master at Arms George Strollum was in his glory hunting sharks. A huge steel hook, baited with meat, was thrown out at the end of a line composed of steel chain and Manila rope.

Strollum made some great catches, but there was one shark, the biggest in the school, which Strollum could not snare. Tempting morsels of meat were offered, but the monster, 20 feet long, seemed to sense the presence of the hook, and winked at the shark hunter as it passed by the alluring bait.

Every shark, Thompson says, is preceded by two small fish which swim just ahead of the shark's nose. If one of these fish is killed, its place is taken by another from somewhere. The two fish are always present, acting as feelers and a scouting expedition for the monster.

When a piece of pork was thrown into the water, the fish would investigate. If there was no hook inside, they would so report, and the shark would enjoy a meal, but as soon as a baited hook had been cast into the water, the small fish would advise the shark and the meal would be left to toss about on the waves.

For several days Strollum tried to induce the shark to grab the hook without result. As a last resort, Thompson went below and came on deck with several bottles of chlorinated fresh lime. A huge piece of pork was brought up. An incision was made and several pounds of the lime inserted and then covered so that water could not reach it.

When this was thrown overboard the scout fish investigated, made a favorable report and the shark rolled over on its back and swallowed the big meal.

For several minutes nothing happened. Then the shark began to show discomfort. It splashed wildly. Soon it rolled over on its back and gas began to bubble from its mouth. Its stomach swelled up like a gas balloon. A few minutes more and the slackening lime did its work. There was a loud explosion and natives picked up shark meat 300 yards away in the mangrove thickets.

Inquiry Into Irish Reprisals Is Not Practical

DUBLIN, Oct. 29.—(By Mail)—In official circles here the suggestion of Lord Robert Cecil, Viscount Grey of Fallodon and Herbert H. Asquith, former British premier, that there must be a public inquiry into the reprisals and Irish military administration generally, is regarded as impracticable. It is said that it would be like trying a commander in face of the enemy. No inquiry would be complete which did not include the men in highest authority. They would either have to repudiate their subordinates or admit responsibility. Inquiry, it is urged, is impossible while the fight lasts.

If the government yielded to the demand for inquiry in the form called for it would mean the resignation of some of the highest officers. It is expected that a day will be given for a debate in parliament on the whole question and that the government will face a division in which it will be supported by all the stalwarts of the unionist party perhaps with Sir Edward Carson and even by most of the liberal coalitionists.
