Public Utilities Will Pay Higher Taxes in 1921

Word has been received by the assessor's office here that the tax ratio of this county has been fixed at 79% for 1920 instead of the 70% of last year. This ratio is fixed each year by the state tax commission and issued as a basis of assessment for public service corporation property situated in this county; and for determining the proportion of tax for state purposes to be collected in this county.

M. L. Johnson, deputy county assessor, said this morning that this revision in ratio indicates that public service corporation property will be taxed somewhat higher this year than formerly, and that there will be a little better distribution of state tax than formerly.

This whole matter was threshed out before the commission at Salem about two weeks ago, Captain J. P. Lee, going to Salem to represent Klamath county at the hearing. Captain Lee reports a general dissatisfaction among assessors present at this hearing with the valuations of public service corporations as fixed by the state tax commission.

Football History Written Saturday

Football history is being written this season as the returns from the games Saturday indicate. For the first time in 12 years the O. A. C. came near defeating Oregon University on the Agricultural field with a score of O to O. It is believed here that Oregon was held down by the slime and mud on the O. A. C. gridiron as this would hinder their open style of play upon which their victories thus far have depended.

California won the right to meet the eastern team this year as well as the state championship when she took Saturday's game from Stanford by a score of 28 to 0. It is also probable that Harvard will be the team to make the western trip again this year as she was victorious over Yale.
