**LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE**

**ANOTHER COURTHOUSE LOOMS ON HORIZON**

Still another courthouse for Klamath county? This is the question aroused in the minds of citizens upon learning of the ambition of a certain section of the county to divide the county and have a new county seat, probably at Bonanza. And the question, with all its significance, is by no means forgotten by a single taxpayer resident of Klamath county. According to reports there has been shown considerable indignation over the proposed splitting off of a certain section of the county.

Information gained from an attorney indicates that under the present laws only persons who have a vote on whether or not a county shall be divided are those actually residing in the part of the county which it is proposed shall secede. This being true, only those people who live east of the township line between ranges 31 to 32 from the California line, about four miles north, then east of the township line six miles farther west and running north the full 124 miles to the county's boundary, would be allowed to decide upon the issue. Since the northern half of this proposed county would be a strip of land about 12 miles wide and 40 or 50 miles long, most of which is on the reservation and is untaxed land, the main populated sections remaining would be Bonanza, Langell valley, and the Malin section, together with parts of Poe valley. These are the sections of Klamath county that would have a new courthouse to build, new county officers to support, and a large proportion of the present county bonded indebtedness to take over.

According to the information obtained regarding the state law a petition signed by a certain number of the residents of the proposed "new county" may be acted on by the county court and then sent to the state legislature to be submitted to the people of the proposed county at the next general primary election, for their approval or rejection. This feature of the law has been changed since the division creating the present Deschutes county was made, at that time the whole state having the vote upon the division of a county. That residents of Bonanza are desirous of having the county divided and the new county seat located there is indicated by reports that have reached here. This suspicion would seem to be confirmed in the fact that other sections of the new county which it is proposed to make have not been solicited with the petition, as well as by the fact that the proposed line cuts out most of the towns or thickly settled sections where opposition to the plan might be more sure to cause its defeat. It has not been learned yet, whether the required number of citizens of the proposed county have signed the petition or not.
