The Health Officer

In three of four short articles I want to call attention to some needed health matters in Klamath Falls and at the end of the year make out a report of health conditions, the remedies that have been applied in the past two years and the measures that should be carried out in the future.

The first of the year I will gladly hand the reins to someone who has the time for this financially neglected but all important office—the safe guarding of your and your neighbor's health and the building of a clean beautiful city in which your children may grow strong and healthy.

There are needed five more officers to the health department of Klamath Falls. Money spent for health insurance is a wise and paying investment.

One policeman should be detained for a sanitary police work. "Safety first" should be his duty.

The most important thing is a county health nurse: First to help stop communicable diseases; Second to help stop the Great White Plague consumption; Third to promote infant welfare; Fourth look after child industrial hygiene; Fifth school work.

We are having an epidemic of measles now. Measles lead to tuberculosis more than any other trouble. Consumption is curable and pre-

ventable but it requires constant care and supervision of a nurse to detect such cases and so to see that they are cured and in that way preventing the menacing of other lives.

There are at least in every community 30 to 40 cases of consumption among each 1000 inhabitants.

Life saving among the babies is carried on principally by the health nurse who can conduct infant welfare campaigns. In New York city infant death rate has been reduced from 300 per 1000 to less than 100 per 1000.

The law compels your child to go to school therefore that some law must protect the health and growth of your child.

Bodily defects must be corrected and sanitary surroundings and sanitary conditions of other children kept at par so your child is not exposed.

The Red Cross and State Tuberculosis association are going to furnish Klamath Co. with a nurse for a few months that the people may see the value of her services and then vote the funds for her permanent employment.

FAMOUS HOUSE STILL STANDS

Mansion Erected by Thomas Hancock on Beacon Hill, Boston, Splendid Piece of Architecture.

The first house of distinction to be built on Beacon hill, in Boston the highest of three elevations which gave to the city the name of "Trimountain," and which was the center of military, social and religious life, was erected by Thomas Hancock, an uncle of the Revolutionary hero. This was in 1737.

It was a beautiful mansion, built of stone, with the ground laid out in orchards and gardens, and it was here that the first tree nursery in Boston was started. Inside great taste was shown in the furnishings, the drawing room containing a rare set of bird's-eye maple, covered with red damask. Hancock was a lavish host, and gave a famous breakfast to the officers of the French fleet.

While the French troops were in Boston forty or more of the officers dined at the house every day. On one occasion, however, so many unexpected guests appeared that Madam Hancock was driven to despair to know how to provide for them, so she had servants milk all the cows pastured on the common, whether this was agreeable to their owners or not. The house is yet considered a splendid piece of architecture.
