

# THREE POWER SITES TAKEN

EUREKA, Cal., Nov. 29.—Klamath river in Humboldt county which for ages has been wasting its waters into the ocean, promises soon to have them utilized for other purposes than those of fishing. The utilization of the river will be a blessing, but just the same it will be dammed and well dammed at that, for from present indications three dams are projected between the ocean and the Siskiyou line and if the projects are carried out the Klamath river in Humboldt county may become one of the greatest power producing streams in northern California.

The first power project was that of the Langford brothers as Ishi Pishi Falls, above Orleans, which now has been turned over to the Electro Metals company, the corporation that is to build the electric reduction works at Trinidad for aluminum and other ores.

The next project was that of the western states gas and electric com-

pany, which has taken up a power site on the lower river and proposes to build a dam seven miles below Martins Ferry or about 10 miles below Weitchpec, which is at the junction of the Trinity river.

Next above this will be another power site located by the electro metals company, with a dam at Slate creek about five miles above Weitchpec, and taking up about ten miles of the river.

Even with these projects there yet is room on the Humboldt reaches of the river for more power for there is plenty of water in the river and plenty of sites for storage dams.

The company furnishes the facilities with which these rights are exercised and the services rendered. These members of the public who constitute the customers, furnish the revenue with which the company is enabled to perform these services. No telephone company can exist without customers, and these customers must be treated with fairness both by the company and by the State. The State does not permit any undue burden to be placed upon a customer.

A public service corporation, in a broad sense, is merely an organized right to render the public a service, and in the same larger sense the service belongs to the company's customers. It follows that the customers are really the company. What benefits or harms the one has a like effect upon the other.

We are anxious that our present customers, applicants for service, and the company shall be treated fairly. To continue to extend our service under our present condition is impossible. We invite our customers, the public of Oregon, to interest themselves in our problem.
