OREGON AGRICULTURAL COL LEGE, Corvallis, Dec. 4 .-- A dairy manufacturing course, lasting eight weeks, will be given at the college commencing January 3. The course will be of a wider scope than has ever been offered before, both in the the sughness of the work and in enrolment requirements. Both experienced and inexperienced persons will be accepted.

Practical work in the college's modern creamery will be the feature of the course. This commercial type of creamery, handling 110,000 ounds of butter annually, and having a daily capacity of 2,000 pounds. will be conducted entirely by the students. A new 1,000-pound Victor churn and a 200-gallon pastuerizer which have just been purchased. bring the equipment entirely up to date.

The cheese department, having a daily capacity of 5,000 pounds of milk, will be in operation during tris course, and the market milk department, handling 200 gallons of milk daily, will be operated entirely by student labor. An order has been placed for a 50-quart brine ice cream freezer to complete the equipment of the department, so that this work may be included in the course.

'At Cummer 20 men who were on the street were stripped and flogged and sent home without clothes

'Uniformed men went into Rafferty's shop for a drink early Saturday morning. That night Rafferty was taken out of bed, naked, taken a mile away and flogged, thrown over a wall and dropped 10 feet into a bed of thistles and netties. He had to scramble out of this position and was made to crawl along the road for 30 yards, all this time being flogged. He was then made to lie fint on the ground and one man stood on the back of his legs so that he could not raise his feet to ward off the blows. The same evening a rope neck and he was dragged back over a wall. His brother got a blow of a revolver in the head. Their sitser was kept in the house by an armed guard.

"People were horrified to learn. that Jeremiah D. Healey, a blacksmith, aged 18. and Patrick J. Harrell, a rural postman ,aged 24, had been shot dead. Bodies found in field 300 yards from town. Both men appeared to have been shot in the head. The young men bore irreproachable characters.

"Devon Road company, Limerick. ooperative creamery was destroy ed by fire on Monday night, the damage running into thousands.

"On Monday, between 3 and o'clock, uniformed men with blacked faces arrived at the house of Miss Sarrett. A voice was heard to give 'Halt!' Rifle firing started, several bullets passing through the window A bomb burst under the bed which she had just left, tearing up the floor and doing enormous damage.

"Many women and children have had to flee from their homes, owing to the nightly scenes of terrorism in Tuam. Monday night houses were raised and men connected with the Transport union taken from their beds. Mr. J. Higgens, secretary, was arrested and Stephen Kane was assaulted. He was kept out all night and terribly beaten by uniformed men for not undertaking to severe his connections with the trades council.

NEW YORK—Police and detectives here are searching for nearly a half million dollars' worth of gems and jewelry stolen from Mrs. Charlotte King Palmer, wealthy divorces here. The thieves first bound and gagged the house servarits after they had answered the doorbell, believing their mistress wished entrance, and then, awaiting Mrs. Palmer's return, seized and gagged her also before stealing jewels she wore, worth \$400,000.
