

COMMUNISTS ACTIVE IN U. S. SAYS SLEUTH

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Dec. 6.—The first "underground party" that the United States has ever seen is now believed to be operating, according to Edward J. Brennan, division superintendent of the bureau of investigation of the department of justice here.

"It appears," he said, "that the members, or a great portion of them, of the communist parties have gone over to a united communist party that seems to be maintaining a secrecy never before attempted by an American radical organization."

"These people appear to be holding meetings with the utmost secrecy with which they can surround them. Names used appear fictitious."

"The Russian element which formed the backbone of the original communist party appear to be in control and to have the bulk of the membership of the new secret organization."

"Literature is frequently distributed without any indication as to where it comes from. In order to escape detection, it appears that the party members take unusual precautions. The members are known among themselves and literature is passed around among them, sometimes by messenger. When mailed, we know that it is done in small quantities, three or four letters or packages in a box in one corner of a city, and three or four in a box in another section."

"The party has its largest membership in Chicago and New York. In Chicago meetings have been made extra difficult by the Illinois law, which forbids renting property to an outlaw organization of this character. Property owners who become suspicious often call us to make sure on this point."

"It is my individual conviction that the united communist party, the old communist party and kindred associations of this nature are unlawful in that they advocate the overthrow of the government by force and violence."

"The original communist party, which was organized here a year ago, took a stand against participating in elections. This it held to be of no use, and it urged a bolshevik program. I have no knowledge myself of literature being recently distributed urging against taking part in the presidential election, as was reported in press dispatches from the east at the time, but if this was the case, it was in line with what the party appears to stand for."

"It will be recalled that pamphlets, literature and circular letters were sent out broadcast to members of the communist party, and that lecturers gave instructions at their meetings that if at any time a member was interviewed or attempted to be interviewed by any person, particularly by a federal or state officer, to answer no question and tell them nothing, and in the

event of a member being arrested, to say nothing, and that as soon as possible he would be provided with a defense.

"Evidence adduced in the trial of John Jaminakas and J. Juodis before Judge Landis here last week disclosed how secretly they were working."

HOLLANDERS OF OLD TIMES

Celchis, Caucasian Tribe, Free People Because They Had Always Command of the Sea.

The inhabitants of Celchis, set in the valleys of the inaccessible Caucasus to the northward of the Aral-ic plains, were the Hollanders of ancient times. They were a free and barbarous people, but were invited to the cultivation of commerce by the vicinity of two seas which were formerly joined towards the north, and attained by means of it to a great degree of opulence which made them celebrated. Their territory of small extent lay on the eastern shore of the Euxine sea. The greater portion of it was marshy, and the atmosphere humid; they had frequent and heavy rains, a great number of channels intersected their plains, on the banks of which the dwellings of the people were placed, raised for the most part upon stakes. The natives of the country were corpulent, and somewhat above the middle stature, and their language was hard of utterance and ungraceful. Their chief river, the Phasis, like the Rhine, lost itself in interminable sands.

Northern Scythia, including the region above Sarmatia and the forests of Germany as far as the frozen sea, was a wilderness through which many pastoral and hunting nations incessantly roamed.—Detroit Free Press.

LIVED MANY CENTURIES AGO

Skeleton of Giant Wombat, Recently Found in Tasmania, Believed to Be 20,000 Years Old.

A complete skeleton recently discovered in the Mowbray marsh, on the far outskirts of the wild marshy regions of Northwest Tasmania confirms the existence 20,000 or 30,000 years ago of a giant wombat (one of the pouched animals peculiar to the Antipodes). The discovery was made by Mr. Lovett, a farmer, who was digging a drain into the swamp.

The skeleton lay buried in six feet of decayed vegetable matter resting on sand that was once the bed of a lake. Mr. Scott of the Launceston museum, examined and excavated the skeleton and expressed the opinion that the animal had lived perhaps more than 20,000 years ago, says the London Daily Mail. It is the only specimen yet discovered. In life the animal would be bigger than a mule, with four elephantine legs and a head very much like a bulldog. Experts believe it to be a smaller species of a gigantic marsupial approaching in size the Brontosaurus (which weighed 80 to 90 tons). It has long, beaklike tusks, and probably lived on herbs and was slow of movement.

The present-day wombat is a burrowing animal from two to three feet long, with a short, thick body, short legs and very little tail.

Refrigeration and Meat

In less than an hour after an animal is dispatched in a Swift & Company packing plant, it is hanging up as meat in a room brought by refrigerating machinery to a temperature just above freezing.


From that time until it is in your own ice box—within two to three weeks—it is kept at the same temperature; first in the coolers at our packing plants; next on our refrigerator cars, more than 6,000 of which are constantly moving to market with their perishable cargoes; then in our refrigerator rooms at our branch selling houses; then in your dealer's ice box, and last in your own.

Only for the few minutes while it is being put into the refrigerator cars at our packing plants, or taken out of them at our branch houses, or whisked to your retailer in our trucks, is it exposed to any change of temperature.

Without a skilled use of this system of cooling, made possible by modern science, you could not get fresh meat, prepared under most sanitary conditions, except at greater expense—unless you happened to live so near live stock raising centers that your needs could be supplied from live stock raised near-by.
