SACRAMENTO, Dec. 10.—Five hundred employees of the Southern Pacific shops here were laid off Wednesday. Announcement to this effect was made by D. S. Watkins, superintendent of the general shops. Notice of the layoff was posted in the shops Friday afternoon in order to give the men the required five days' warning.

SACRAMENTO, Dec. 10.—National educators, together with teachers and laymen interested in educational affairs, held a two-days' regional conference in the Native Sons' hall. The conference, called by United States Commissioner of Education P. P. Claxton, is one of 12 to be held throughout the nation.

SACRAMENTO, Dec. 10.—Burglars and hold-up men secured loot over the week-end which the police estimate to approach \$10,000 in value. House breakers took the lead in operations, entering the residence dis-

trict and taking away some choice jewelry and household articles.

The biggest burglary was that of the Kushman Jewelry and Second-hand store at 314 K street, where clothing and a great variety of jewelry valued at nearly \$5000 were stolen.

GRASS VALLEY, Dec. 10.—By hurling himself into the path of a speeder, driven at high speed by his playmate, Carlton Thomas, Billy George, 6-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. A. E. George, checked the onrush and saved Carlton from going under the wheels of an automobile.

The accident occurred at Auburn and Neal streets, near the homes of the boys. Billy received a blow in the face from the speeder which gave him a black eye, and Carlton was also bruised. Each missed the automobile by a narrow margin.

SISSON, Dec. 10.—Rev. Nelson of the local Methodist church has purchased a moving picture outfit, and will use it to show educational films on his circuit which includes Edge-

wood and Gazette, where they have no picture shows.

GETS NAME CHANGED

NETS \$450, CHICKENS
TACOMA, Wash., Dec. 10.—Alma Oekfen, age 12, a McKenna school girl, cleared \$451.82 from her flock of chickens for the year just ended and made one of the best records reported to the county boys and girls clubs. She has 220 chickens, and they produced 924 dozen eggs during the year. The eggs sold for \$651.72, and gave a net profit of \$451.82.

Standard Oil Co.
Predicts Record
Production 1920

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 10.—Records for production of crude oil in California probably will be broken this year, the Standard Oil company announced recently. It is probable, the company said, that the present record of 163,623,695 barrels, set in 1914, will be broken by approximately 2,000,000 barrels.

California, the company declared, may soon take from Oklahoma the leadership on the list of the nation's oil producing states. The Oklahoma daily average production is around 305,000 barrels per day. In October of this year California averaged 305,192 barrels a day.

To November 1, California produced 86,269,168 barrels of oil during the year and needed 17,354,527 to tie the record set six years ago. To tie the record a production of 282,861 is needed for November and December. As the daily average for October was more than 305,000, and the prospects good for increased production in November and December, it was believed the record would be broken.
