California's 13 presidential electors, three of whom are women, will meet at Sacramento on Monday, January 10, 1921, formally to cast the state's electoral vote for Senator Warren G. Harding for president and Governor Calvin Coolidge vice president.

The balloting usually takes place in the senate chamber at the capital and is without unusual ceremony. The procedure of the electors is fixed by law. They must meet at 2 p. m. on the second Monday in January following their election and proceed to vote by ballot for one person for president and one person for vice-president of the United States, one of whom, the law says," is not an inhabitant of this state."

At the conclusion of the balloting, the result of the vote is certified and transmitted by mail to the president of the United States senate. The electors are allowed \$10 by the state as compensation for their services and ten cents a mile traveling expenses from their home towns to Sacramento and return.

In the event of the death of a presidential elector, or other inability to discharge his duties, the law requires the electors present to select from among the citizens of the state as many persons as will supply the vacancies.
