ter bringing him and Mrs. Ingersoll together was: "Did you say my wife gave you a disease."

Henry, according to the testimony, hesitated, and then said: "Well, I've got one."

Ingersoll then, according to the witness, asked Henry whether he said he had had improper relations with Mrs. Ingersoll, and the latter, pointing finger at Henry said: "Henry, if you say so, you are a liar."

"Well, I am not a liar," replied Henry.

Reached for Gun

Reaching toward his hip pocket, said the witness, an act which was interpreted by Martin Stoehsler to mean that he was going to produce "knucks," he almost immediately brought forward his right hand, and shot from his hip. Previous to firing shot, both men backed away from each other.

Just as the first shot was fired, said the witness, Henry turned as if to run. The second shot according to the witness was also fired in Henry's general direction.

Says Ingersoll Struck

Going back over the details the witness said that he was sure Ingersoll had struck at Henry just before shooting, and that Henry had warded off the blow, and assumed a defensive posture. When the shot was fired, the stricken boy cried "Oh my," folding his hands across his abdomen, and reeling away from Ingersoll for a distance of perhaps 50 yards before he fell.

On cross examining, Attorney O'Neill again went over the details of the location, the assumed cornering of Ingersoll by the crowd as if to promote trouble and other things. Asked point blank whether the witness with the crowd did not deliberately corner Ingersoll, the witness emphatically replied: "No sir!"

Martin Stoehsler, said the witness, grabbed Ingersoll immediately after the shooting. It was not too dark to distinguish the men, the witness testified.

Judge Hails Lawyer

At this juncture the judge admonished Attorney O'Neill not to supply the testimony for the witness, the thought evidently being that the attorney was "leading" the witness.

No attempt was made to attack Ingersoll, by Henry, the witness stated.

James Nail, postmaster and general merchandise dealer at Dairy said that he was present at the meeting on the fatal night. He had observed no trouble between the men during the meeting. His testimony was a corroboration of previous witnesses who had been present during the trouble.

Again Judge Campbell mildly rebuked Attorney O'Neill for virtually assuming facts by his method of questioning. Nail said he heard Ingersoll say, while his arms were pinioned by Martin Stoehsler after the shooting, that he would "shoot them all."

Benjamin Presley told substantially the same story as told by the other witnesses. He said he did not hear all that had been said, but that he had "heard plenty," and that the second shot went a "little bit in his direction." Presley refused to be confused in the cross examination.

Robert Flackus, aged 19, now attending high school in Ashland, went over the same ground covered by other witnesses. Henry, he said, did not strike back after Ingersoll had struck at him. Again Attorney O'Neill, on cross examination, led his witness over the now monotonous details of the location, the degree of darkness, and finally wound up by asking the witness if "he was inside the telephone pole," said telephone pole having figured prominently in the effort to ascertain location of the principals during the controversy. "What do you mean telegraph pole," inquired the witness.

Attorney Vexed

Attorney Manning, for the prosecution, objected to the questioning several times on the grounds that it was too general, causing Attorney O'Neill to remark heatedly: If you can't keep still, keep as still as you can. I've lost my question; pardon me your honor.

"Is it not a fact that Henry struck the first blow?" asked Mr. Irwin. Witness replied that they did not strike at each other.

Waldo Jones, aged 18, of Dairy, said he was at the meeting the night of the shooting, and testified almost precisely as his predecessors did.

Earl Allred, brother of Mrs. Martin Stoehsler, repeated the testimony of the others, except that he stated that Ingersoll declared he would "put an end to any damn man who will say that."

He was believed, had no weapon

ons on his person at the time of the shooting.

"Isn't it a fact that you were instrumental in precipitating this trouble," asked Attorney O'Neill.

Attorney Manning objected to the question, and was sustained.

Mercury Stood at 12 Above 'Smorning
