**LIVELY TIME LOOMS TONIGHT**

The phonograph for the county hospital was purchased by the committee in charge of the fund yesterday afternoon and will be taken to the hospital today. J. H. Short, superintendent announced this morning.

Mr. Short has approximately a hundred records that have been donated during the solicitation campaign, and expects a lively session in the big living room at the infirmary this evening.

The committee purchased a Brunswick machine from H. J. Winters. They had a delicate task to pick one type among the standard makes of machines, but all agreed finally on the Brunswick.

A determining factor, however, was the price. Mr. Winters formerly had the Brunswick agency, now carried by the Square Deal drug store. The machine purchased was one left over in the Winters stock. It regularly sells well above the price paid for it, \$235, but the committee was limited to that amount and the deal was made. Whether Mr. Winters came down to the limit of their paying ability, or whether individuals of the committee chipped in some more cash, even Mr. Short did not know, but he was satisfied he had a bargain.

Two more donations were received this morning, one of \$5 from the Loyal Boreans of the Christian church and the other, \$2, from John L. Bailey of Merrill.

Mr. Short has not decided how to use surplus donations. He can use the money to purchase records, but he has a good supply of records. He might use it for little presents

for the patients. Then he has a bargain in the way of a billiard table in view.

"But the money was given for the phonograph fund," he said today, "and I do not wish to divert it without consulting the wishes of the subscribers. I'd welcome suggestions from any source on the matter of this billiard table."

**Copy of Latest Agreement on Dam Building Received**

A copy of the supplementary contract between John Barton Payne, secretary of the interior, and the California-Oregon Power company, drawn for the purpose of clarifying the meaning of the original contract for building the Link River dam, has been received by the local reclamation service office.

The provisions of the contract—deepening of the Keno and main canal approaches, holding the Upper Lake level at all times to at least an elevation of 4137 above sea level, protection for Upper Lake navigation, and reiteration of the paramount rights of the United States to all waters of the Klamath watershed, under its blanket filing of May 17, 1905 (exception private rights acquired before that date) were given in The Herald of December 11, the date of signing, in an Associated Press dispatch.

**City Council Has Very Light Session**

Last night's meeting of the city council was devoid of unusual interest, the granting of five building permits constituting the only business of importance. J. B. Vollmer was given permission to build an addition to his house in Fairview, and O. H. Aronsen was given permission to operate a skating rink in the basement of the Scandinavian hall.

William Hoskins will be permitted to build a three roomed house in Hot Springs addition, W. H. Owens to erect a frame dwelling in the Hot Springs addition, and A. H. Hale was authorized to install an electric sign in front of his place of business at 1014 Main street.

Sewer difficulties were discussed, but no solution to the difficulties was reached.

**Chief Reiterates Warning Against Christmas Candles**

Despite repeated warnings by Fire Chief Delaney, the purchase of candles for Christmas tree illumination, goes on.

"Use of candles among the flimsy decorations of the average Christmas tree is a direct invitation for serious fire loss, perhaps loss of human life," said the chief today, "and I am doing all I can to discourage the practice. Electrical lighting, properly installed by a competent electrician, is safe and the cost is little more."

"Why should one consider the few cents extra expense, if there is any, when safety of life is involved?"

"I believe the use of candles approaches criminal negligence, and I think if a fire was caused that destroyed another's property that an action of damages could be sustained in the courts."

"I feel very strongly on this subject and I hope the Herald will join me in a campaign discourage the use of candles or other unprotected lighting for this year's Christmas trees in Klamath Falls."

**Loyal Legion Accepts Wage Cut**
