TWO CONVICTED OF VIOLATING TRUST LAW

PORTLAND, Dec. 24.—R. P. Butchart, president and Clark Moore, former sales manager of the Portland Cement company, were convicted on two counts in the federal court here today on an indictment charging the company with a violation of the anti-trust laws. Thirty days were allowed for the motion of a new trial. The men were on trial twice, the first jury disagreed. The indictment charged that the men as officers of the company had entered into an agreement with other cement manufacturers along the coast under which all territory in Oregon was divided and monopolized, from July 19, 1914, until the present indictment was returned.
