**SUMMONS**  
**Equity No. 1234**

**IN THE CIRCUIT COURT OF THE STATE OF OREGON, FOR KLAMATH COUNTY.**

G. L. Holbrook, Plaintiff, vs. Fannie A. Paddock and J. E. Paddock, her husband; Ben W. Olcott, Governor; Sam A. Koser, Secretary of State; and O. P. Hoff, State Treasurer; constituting the State Land Board of the State of Oregon. First State & Savings Bank, a corporation; E. Mechem and W. H. Linn, Defendants. To Fannie A. Paddock and J. E. Paddock, her husband; Ben W. Olcott, Governor; Sam A. Koser, Secretary of State; and O. P. Hoff, State Treasurer; constituting the State Land Board of the State of Oregon. First State & Savings Bank, a corporation, E. Mechem and W. H. Linn, the above named defendants.

**IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON:**

You are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit on or before the 4th day of February, 1921, that being the last day of the time prescribed in the order of publication of summons herein; and if you fail so to appear, plead, answer, demur, or otherwise move herein, within said time, for want thereof, plaintiff will apply for the relief prayed for in his complaint herein, as follows, to-wit:

That he be given judgment and decree against the defendants and each and all of them for the foreclosure of the mortgage mentioned in the complaint in this cause, and recorded in book 14, Records of Mortgages of Klamath County, Oregon, at page 584 thereof, which said mortgage was given by the defendants, Fannie A. Paddock and J. E. Paddock, to secure the payment of two promissory notes, dated December 1st, 1913, one in the amount of \$1500 and the other in the amount of \$1884.00, and due December 1st, 1914 and December 1st, 1915, respectively, and bearing 8% interest per annum from date. That he recover of and from the defendants the sum of \$1385.68, together with interest thereon from October 13, 1920, at the rate of 8% per annum; for the sum of \$150, as attorney's fees herein, together with plaintiff's costs and disbursements and accruing costs. That the liens claimed by the defendants and each of them upon said mortgaged premises be declared subsequent in time and inferior in right to the mortgage of the plaintiff, except the lien of the State Land Board of the State of Oregon, which is hereby conceded to be superior thereto; that the lien of plaintiff's said mortgage be declared a first, prior and superior lien to all other liens against said property, except said State Land Board's mortgage. That the usual decree of sale be made by the Court for the sale of said mortgaged premises, except the personal property mentioned in said mortgage. That said sale be made by the sheriff of Klamath County, according to law. That the proceeds of said sale be applied, first, toward the payment of the costs and expenses of this suit and of said sale.

Second, in the payment of the plaintiff's judgment and decree herein, including said attorney's fees;

Third, in the payment of whatever legal liens may exist against the said property, as shown by the pleadings and proofs in this cause; and that all persons claiming said lands by lien or proceedings subsequent to the execution of plaintiff's said mortgage be barred and foreclosed of all right claim or equity of redemption in and to said premises; and that plaintiff have such other and further relief as to equity may appertain.

This summons is served upon the said defendants by the publication thereof in The Evening Herald, a newspaper published of general circulation in Klamath County and the State of Oregon once a week for six successive weeks. The first publication thereof, being made December 24, 1920; and the last publication February 4, 1921; by order of the Honorable D. V. Kuykendall, Judge of the above entitled Court, which said order was made, entered and filed in the said court and cause, December 23, 1920.

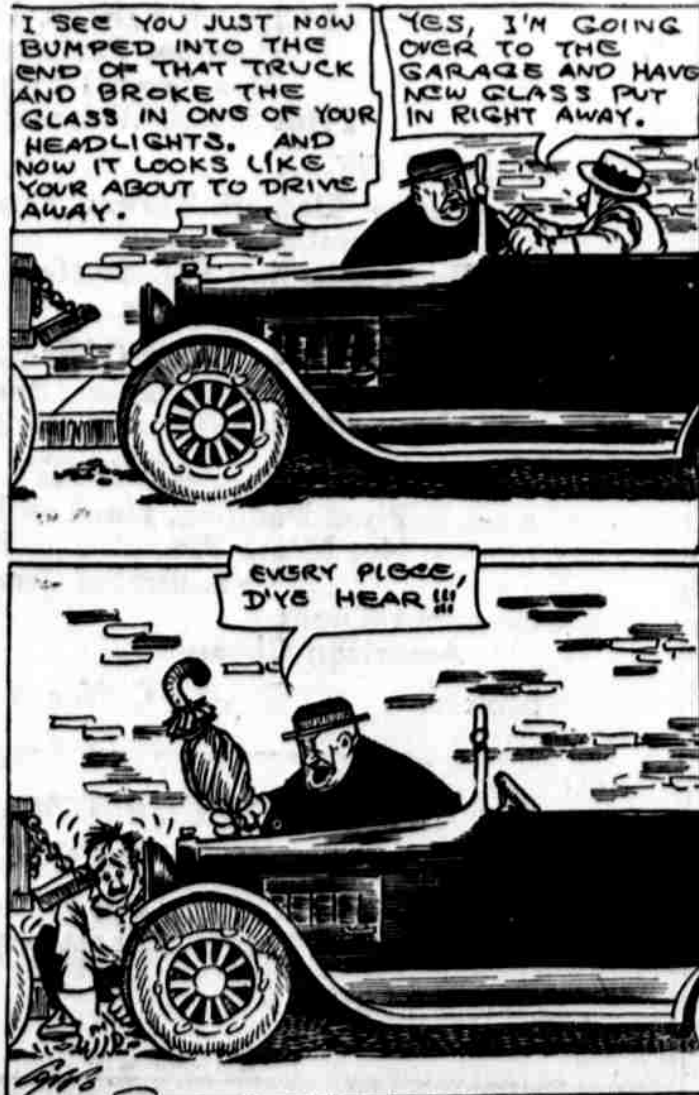
