CARELESSNESS WITH FIRES

A few years ago, a careful study of fire causes in nearly one-half million cases was made in every state of the Union by the actuarial bureau of the national board of fire underwriters, and the conclusions reached established the clear case of preventability.

An examination made by the fire marshal into the causes of fires in three boroughs of New York city in a single year shows that putting out fires is futile unless fire prevention is enlarged. The examination showed these causes of fires:

- Careless with lighted matches, 1366.
Children playing with matches, 354.
Careless in smoking, 970.
Careless with candles, 409.
Carelessness with gas lights, ranges, etc., 530.
Overheated stoves, pipes, etc., 446.
Chimney fires, 509.
Bonfires, brush fires, etc., 698.
Miscellaneous partly preventable causes, 659.

Concentrated attention to fire prevention, more efficient methods of fire fighting and more efforts at legislation designed to apprehend and punish carelessness and willful causing of fires are necessary to bring about a decline in losses. Persistent instruction in forming habits of carefulness in the home and school is imperative.
