CARLESSNESS WITH FIRES

A few years ago, a careful study of fire causes in nearly one-half milmion cases was made in every state of the Union by the actuarial bureau of the national board of fire under writers, and the conclusions reached established the clear case of preventability.

An examination made by the fire marshal into the causes of fires in three boroughs of New York city in a single year shows that putting out fires is futile unless fire prevention is enlarged. The examination showed these causes of fires:

Careless with lighted matches. 1366.

Children playing with matches, 354.

Carless in smoking, 970.

Carless with candles, 409. Carlessness with gas lights, ranges, etc., 530.

Overheated stoves, pipes, etc., 446. Chimney fires, 509.

Bonfires, brush fires, etc., 698.


