New Coffee Urn At Rex Cafe

A monster coffee percolator, a duplicate of which it is said cannot be found between here and San Francisco, has just been installed in the Rex cafe by the proprietor, Ross Nickerson. This urn is about 50 inches high with a diameter of 30 inches and will hold 20 gallons of water in addition to 10 gallons of coffee...

The percolator has steam attachments and it is possible to make coffee in it within 15 minutes. Mr. Nickerson said that it will be necessary to refill the urn four or five times a day, and the percolating mechanism, which does not permit the coffee to touch the water at any time, insures the purest and best cup of coffee obtainable. This percolator replaces two five-gallon containers, the latter, now standing near the new one, looking infinitely small in comparison.
