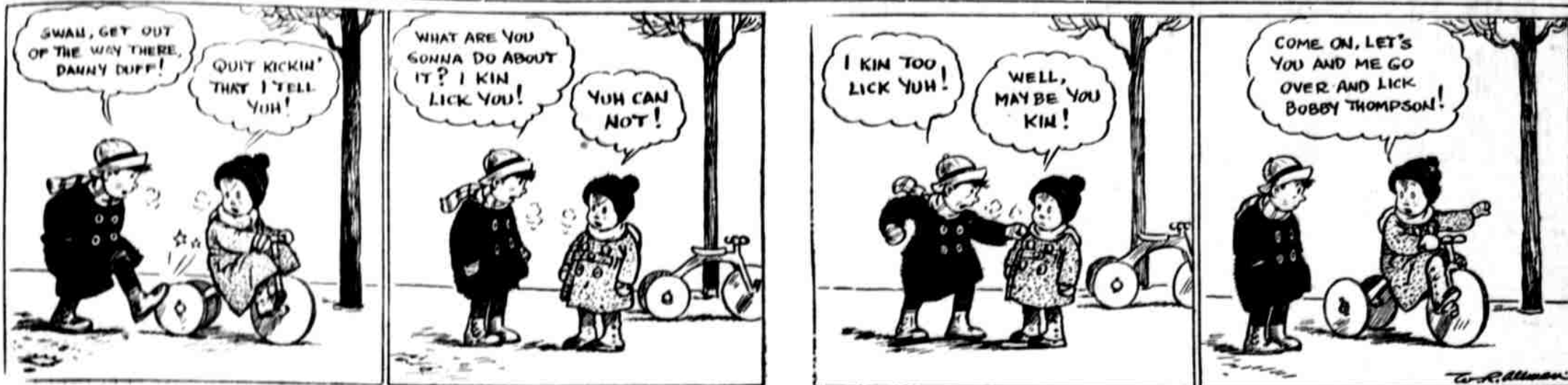

FRENCH, BRITISH GET BIG SHARE GERMAN TRADE

BERLIN, Dec. 7.—(By Mail).—American business scouts who have been scouring Germany in the last few months in search of contracts have virtually abandoned the field to the British and French and gone home according to information reaching the American Association of Commerce and Trade here. While exports and imports between the United States and Germany continue to gradually increase, the Americans say, the majority of the big manufacturing and buying firms of Germany already have signed long time contracts with the British and French, who sent armies of representatives into the country as soon as the armistice was signed. The Germans who have not contracted with the British and French, but have held back in the belief that it would be to their advantage to tie up with the Americans, are becoming discouraged and American business men here say unless there is soon a resumption of official relations between the two countries, and probably a stabilization of exchange, it must be many months before a treaty is signed before the Americans will again have their proportionate pre-war share of German trade. The German government is keenly alive to the situation and has taken a hand, unofficially, in recent transactions by which it was believed business relations between the two countries would be fostered. When the National Cash Register company recently sought permission of the political economy sub-committee of the imperial economic council to import tools and patterns for a factory in Germany.

The German foreign office took an active interest and it said even directed the committee to make a favorable report although some of Germany's most powerful financial influences were objecting. Other American concerns have applied for permission to import machinery and manufactured articles, but the economic council has thus far withheld the permission on the ground the articles could be produced in Germany. The German government's principal objection to importations at this time is based upon the low exchange value of the mark. Until the mark is stabilized, the Germans believe trade should be encouraged on the basis of exchange of goods, or that only such importations should be permitted as will encourage German production and form a market for German labor.

BREEDING TELLS IN PIG CONTEST

This is the story of a pig-growing contest that centered between two boys of Onslow county, N. C., sent to the United States department of agriculture by a county agent, as an illustration of the value of purebred stock as against scrub animals. Leslie Williams and Hermann Gurganus are boys of the same age, living near together and attending the same school. They became interested in the pig-fattening competition in the local boys' club, and enlisted the services of the county agent to induce their fathers to buy them purebred pigs to start with. One father ordered the blooded porker; the other gave his son an apparently promising homegrown animal of uncertain ancestry, agreeing that if any other boy in the club beat his son's record he would buy a purebred pig. The two boys kept expense accounts and weighed their pigs once a month. The purebred pig weighed 37 pounds at the start, May 10, and the other pig 50 pounds. The final record was made five months later, October 10, three days before the county fair. The purebred pig had consumed \$17.60 worth of middlings, corn, peanut meal, and tankage, and made a gain of 131 pounds. The other pig consumed \$15.90 worth of corn and gained only 26 pounds, costing more than 60 cents a pound.

The unsuccessful young pig owner was keenly disappointed, but took heart when his father made good his agreement and put in an order for a purebred pig, not only for the boy but for himself.
