Former County Club Leader Loses Home In Wyoming By Fire

A clipping sent to The Herald by T. F. Boggs, of Lorella, tells of a fire which destroyed the residence of C. D. Chorpensing, at Torrington, Wyoming, the contents of the building, and also a Chevrolet car being a total loss. Mr. Chorpensing was starting the car in the garage with the doors closed, when the engine back-fired, ignited the escaping gas, and exploded through the exhaust. He jumped through a window to escape. The progress of the fire, which communicated itself to the dwelling, was so rapid that he barely had time to carry out his two children, and a few articles of clothing. There was some insurance.

The Chorpensing family lived here while Mr. Chorpensing was head of the boys and girls' club in this county, and were well acquainted in Klamath Falls and vicinity. They left here in December, 1918.
