AT THE LIBERTY

There is no work more thrilling, nor position requiring more daring than that of a private or officer in the Royal Northwest Mounted police. These Canadian guardians of the law are known the world over for their courage and resourcefulness, and the history of the organization is one of endless hazard and romance.

Jacques Jaccard, the Universal director, who is known as the leader of thrill-dispensers in the films, is the author and supervisor of "Under Northern Lights," a story of the Canadian northwest coming to the Liberty theatre today. Her body is found by Abner, a negro servant, who tells MacLeod of LaRoque's relations with the girl. The resulting incidents, which throb with heart interest and pulsate with red blooded action, bring the story to a satisfying ending.
